Record Budget For Australia

SYDNEY, Sept. 3 (CP Cable) - A record budget of \$550,000,000 (\$1,963,000,000) was introduced in the House of Representatives today by Treasurer Joseph P. Chifley, calling for increased excise duties and entertainment taxes and incorporating war expenditure of nearly \$490,000,000.

Money marked for war expenditure, more than double that in last year's budget, included a substantial sum for supplies, services and accommodation for United States forces in Australia under reciprocal lend-lease arrangements. Mr. Chifley also announced a \$1,000,000 loan to begin a "national austerity campaign" designed to prevent inflation and further check civilian consumption.

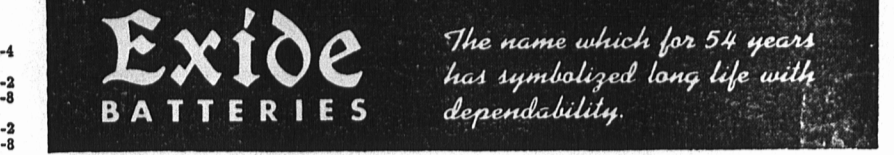
Tobacco and alcoholic beverages will be affected by the increase in excise duties. A pint of beer will go up 2 1-2 pence, a bottle of spirits will cost 21 shillings, seven pence and a bottle of Australian-made 13 shillings, three pence. An ounce of medium-quality tobacco will cost one shilling, five pence and a package of cigarettes 10 pence.

The amusement taxes will be greater than any ever charged by the state government, from which the federal government recently took over the tax. The new rates will be three pence on the shilling with another two pence on every additional six pence up to five shillings thereafter. Mr. Chifley announced that the government would introduce a bill giving it blanket powers to carry out the war program and ask that these powers be continued after the war "by constitutional referendum" to

THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC AN ENEMY OF CIVILIZATION

Congressman Rankin's reply to criticism in House of Representatives of Liquor Sales around Army Camps Hon. John E. Rankin, speech delivered in House of Representatives, Tuesday, May 26, 1942.

VIOLATES SPIRIT OF BILL OF RIGHTS

"It not only tends to undermine the moral of men in our armed forces but it is wrecking the lives and destroying the character of the children of this country. Every time you turn on the radio, some propagandist is pouring poison into the ears of your children, prating about the virtues of strong drink. They would not dare come in through the door and preach such rot; but they come through the radio in violation of the spirit of the Bill of Rights, which was designed to protect you from such outrages.

WEAKENS PUBLIC MORALS, DESTROYS HOMES, AND WEAKENS MORALE OF OUR FIGHTING FORCES

"Liquor is one of the greatest weapons the enemies of democracy, the enemies of Christianity, the enemies of our civilization now have at their disposal. It is more deadly than the bombing plane, and more treacherous than the submarine. It is relentless and implacable. It passes at no Rubicon; it halts at no Delaware and wherever it goes it conquers and destroys.

A CONQUERING FOE

"It conquers amidst the snow-drifts of the north, where the grandeur of Napoleon's army is winding sheet; it conquers amidst the burning sands of the south, where the forces of Alexander halted in midday. It acted as a fifth columnist at the attack on Pearl Harbor and is today hand in glove with the enemies of morality.

THE CHURCH AND THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC

"(A quoted Editorial) "It is an ever existing discredit that the liquor trade also has said, 'Without the help of the Church people, our trade could never have been brought back to legalizing status. But it is a poor rule that would work both ways. The liquor trade could not remain in public respect, or even its existence tolerated, till tomorrow noon if the church people would unite against it. 'If tomorrow morning, every single member of a Christian church should announce and adhere to the fixed policy of drinking no alcoholic beverage, of refusing to sell it, advertise it, rent a building for it, trade at any store where it is sold, or act as a witness for the trade, would throw up its hands in despair. 'Talk about the church being a weak institution? It has the greatest moral power of any organized force in the world. But it is not using it.'"
