## Leafs Lose To Detroit After Winning From N. Y. In Week-End Games

DETROIT, March 12 (CP)—With (Mud) Bruneteau hammering in three goals for the hat trick the Detroit Red Wings closed their National Hockey League season series with Toronto with a 4-1 victory before 12,184 fans tonight. The decision gave Detroit six wins and two ties with the Maple Leafs for the season.

Bruneteau's third goal, with less than two minutes to play in the final period, was his 34th of the season and helped the Wings gain a tighter grip on second place in the National Hockey League race. Detroit now has 54 points, six more than Toronto.

BOSTON, March 12 (AP)—Lach supplying the last-minute spark necessary to do the trick, the Montreal Canadiens won Saturday night to clinch up their 23rd game without defeat on home ice this season.
