**Canon Simpson Memorial Fund**  
A meeting of all Committees formed for the purpose of erecting a Memorial to the late Canon Simpson was held in the Guild Room, 141 July, 8.15 p. m. The Chairman, Mr. W. P. Tidmarsh, called for reports. Mr. R. L. Cotton, Chairman of the Committee for Subscriptions from the Congregation stated that promises to the amount of \$7568.00 had been received and that payments due in the present year would amount to \$3921.00. All members of the Congregation had not yet been canvassed, but it was probable that another \$200.00 might be realized. Mr. W. M. Tidmarsh, Chairman of Committee for subscriptions from outside the Congregation, stated that promises of \$1939.00 had been received. The amount realized from the sale of bricks by the children of the Sunday School was \$56.35, in addition to these promises amounting \$280.00 was set aside previously. It will thus be seen that the objective of \$10,000.00 for the Memorial has practically been reached. The Congregation decided at their last annual meeting that as soon as \$5000 had been paid in the work on the Memorial will be commenced. At present the sum of \$14339.97 is in the hands of the Treasurer, Mr. E. G. Coombs. Further information will be made public from time to time.

SKOKIE COUNTRY CLUB, Glencoe, Ill., July 18.—Gene Sarazen of Pittsburg a little twenty one year old native-born American of Italian descent, yesterday pushed his way out in front of many of the world's greatest golfers and won the national open golf championship by a score of 288 for seventy two holes of play, lasting two days. Up to three years ago Sarazen was a caddie. He is the youngest man who ever held the open championship.

**Firemen Killed During Stubborn Blaze in New York**  
NEW YORK, July 19.—A stubborn puzzling warehouse fire in the Greenwich Village section of the city broke out about eight o'clock this morning, burned through the day, and was still blazing tonight after nearly 4,000 gallons of water had been placed on the flames by forty hose lines. With the flames checked but not conquered, investigation showed that two firemen had been killed, three more were missing, about fifteen persons had been taken to hospitals, seriously injured and more than 175 had received first aid treatment at three emergency stations opened by the Red Cross. In addition, about 500 families were driven from their homes in the Bohemian quarter, and tonight were barred by the police from returning lest the warehouse walls collapsed. The outstanding feature of the fire was the mysterious pungent black smoke that rolled out of the building soon after the first of the blasts. Firemen used search lights in an effort to pierce the gloom. Although the property damage could not be accurately estimated without a check of the contents, said to include newspaper, rubber, rice and opium salts, it was evident that it would run into the hundreds of thousands.
