A RUMOR WITH LITTLE PROBABILITY.

Some Conservative journals are predicting a general election for the Dominion to be held next autumn. They admit that there is no very solid reason for a strong Government, with an ample majority and with three years of the parliamentary term yet unexpired, to now appeal to the country. That must be sufficiently apparent to every one, but the alert Tory editors and their Ottawa correspondents see signs and dream dreams of a general election next fall.

What are the signs that point to an election? For what purpose are Sir Wilfrid and Mr. Graham, perhaps Mr. Fielding also, to make a tour of the west in July and August next? Why all the vote-getting money in the supplementary estimates, the money to begin the Hudson Bay Railway, and to renovate all the harbors and piers, if there is not to be an early election? Why all the tons of literature being sent out from Ottawa, and why the unusual activity of the Liberal machine there unless an election is coming?

Such questionings are not very convincing and if one turns to ask instead of attempting to answer he may still not learn very much. He will perhaps be told that while it would be unusual to dissolve Parliament in its second year and hard to find a pretext for so doing, yet it is the unexpected that happens in these days. One has it that the pretext will be to ratify the new navy policy. Another thinks Sir Wilfrid wants to secure a new lease before the finish of the Transcontinental and the full revelation of its cost.

We regard the rumor of an election as altogether improbable and baseless. True the prosperity of the country, the absence of any embarrassing questions or complications in the Liberal party and the rather troubled and disorganized state of the Opposition might serve to indicate the near future as a hopeful date for another Liberal triumph. Sir Wilfrid might perhaps feel somewhat inclined to add a fifth to his four successive victories at the polls, as soon as may be, but he can well afford to wait at least another year, and until after the census is taken. And nobody wants an election now.

VICTORIOUS LABOR IN THE COMMONWEALTH.

The significance of the general election in the Australian Commonwealth lies in the fact that the Labor party, which had been steadily growing in strength until it held the balance between the two older political parties, has now attained a majority over both of them combined. And so responsive is the system of government to the expressed will of the people that in one week Premier Deakin has given up the reins of power to the victorious Labor leader Mr. Forrest.

This is quicker than we make such changes in Canada. The Mackenzie Government, defeated at the polls on September 17, 1878, held office till October 16 following. Sir Charles Tupper's ministry was defeated at the general election of June 23, 1896 and resigned on July 8 following. The latter instance was a record in the line of promptness so far as Canada is concerned since confederation, but in Australia the time has been reduced one half.

AS TO GAMBLING IN CHARLOTTETOWN.

There has been some discussion of late as to gambling in Charlottetown. There is reason to fear that there has been too much of it here, as in other cities. All the forms of vice and immorality prevail in greater or less extent in cities small or great, and this despite the laws which were long since enacted for the purpose of restricting or abolishing such evils. We cannot think that Charlottetown is worse in that regard than other cities of its size in Canada, or so bad as some. Our city is the soberest in Canada, yet there are some cases of drunkenness here. In no city that we know of do a larger proportion of the people attend religious worship, and yet we know that some are profane, dishonest, untruthful, immoral. Error and wrong have not disappeared from this or any other community, and it is the duty of all good citizens to use their best endeavors to support the right and resist the wrong.

For some, but perhaps not for all the forms of wrong-doing, publicity affords a most useful check. Against all the forms of wrong doing it is the clear duty of pastors and churches to wage warfare by the most energetic and judicious methods. Gambling is a ruinous vice. No reputable business man would willingly, or could afford to be known as a habitual gambler. The habitual gambler belongs to the

criminal class, however reluctant he may be to accept such classification. For this reason gambling operations are usually confined to a limited coterie and conducted in secrecy. We trust the discussion of the subject may do good, set some of the amateur gamblers thinking, show them whether they are drifting and so check a growing evil. It is not a question whether there is more or less gambling in Charlottetown than in other cities. If there is any, there is too much, and it ought to be checked by all the moral and legal forces that can be brought to bear against it.
