In conformity with the Bank Act, we submit to you today our General Statement and Profit and Loss Account for the year 1924-25, ended on the 30th of November last. This is the 25th statement since the foundation of the Bank. It is a pleasure to state that the financial situation of the Bank during the year 1924-25 has been generally satisfactory during the last year, and that the business of the Bank has been conducted in a prudent and conservative manner. The assets of the Bank have increased by nearly five million dollars since the end of the year 1923-24, and the liabilities have increased by about the same amount.
