Charlottetown Boy Gives His Life for a Friend.

Drowning of Fred Young Some Years Ago in St. John—The Story of Heroism Retold.

The following has reference to a Charlottetown boy whose heroic deed was the subject of admiration throughout Canada and for whom a monument now stands on King Square, St. John.

The young man was a son of Robert Young of Montreal and formerly a student of this city.

It was the noonday hour, and a day on which the very elements seemed at war with each other.

A young man of eighteen summers was hurrying back to his work, and as he neared the shore, there arose a cry of distress, for a lad playing beside that madened flood was borne away by one fierce blast upon its waves, then rolling mountains high.

With the agility of youth, and a staunch, strong nature, he had the work of a man by almost immediately appearing with a life buoy, to which was attached a coil of rope.

Alas, the rope attached to the life buoy was too short, and just as another coil of rope was at hand, in a moment the brave boy was engulfed in the life-line, noble Frederick Young plunged into those raging waves, which by hundreds had had gathered on the shore stood awestricken, and almost breathless.

All human efforts proved unavailing. Boat after boat was launched, but was as quickly dashed to pieces. Men tied ropes around their bodies, and tried to reach him, but all in vain.

While it is common to speak only good of the dead, much that was good could be said of our hero in life.

At the age of fifteen, he was a member of the Christian Endeavor Society. He was often heard to explain, "I want to be something, I'm dreaming that I will be some day."

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A PROMINENT C. P. R. OFFICIAL

"Jimmy" McKenna, the Well-Known Travelling Passenger Agent.

Sketch of this Popular Railway Man—The Gripsack Tells a Few of His Good Qualities.

The following portrait of James McKenna, the courteous C. P. R. travelling passenger agent who has been for the past few days in Charlottetown, is of the latest vintage, and is a speaking likeness of "Jimmy," as he is called by his familiar.

How old is he? Some of his friends may ask. Random guesses might place him anywhere from 30 to 50.

He is the senior traveller on the C. P. R. and has been on the road for about twenty-one years, and in that time has travelled nearly a million and a quarter miles, equi l to more than two return trips to the moon or nearly fifty journeys around the world.

Eight years Mr. McKenna moved around New England, and during his service with the C. P. R. he has also travelled out from Montreal and Quebec, as well as St. John. He has been over the whole of the C. P. R. several times, has done the United States from east to west, and south to New Orleans, but has never made any trip of any account by boat, these latter being confined to short passages to Newfoundland, and across the bay to P. E. Island.

And the best of it all is that he always travels "deadhead" and never has to pay for a ticket. All transportation companies issue to officials of their roads annual passes, and Mr. McKenna has a large pocketful of these.

Every conductor in the country knows "Jimmy" and his face carries him anywhere.

In Feb. 1886, this popular railway official, who had been for three years

President of the Emerald Snow-Shoe Club, was presented with an elegant gold locket, on one side of which is the crest of a club, surrounded by a toque and now-shoes; at the bottom, "Fugh a Ballagh" in raised letter. On the other side is engraved: "Presented to James McKenna, Esq., Ex-President of the Emerald Snow-shoe Club, as a token of esteem and remembrance of his past record, when a resident of the city of Quebec, from the members of the club."
