As the steamer Boavista, Capt. D. C. Frazer, was leaving St. John's last week, a young boy named Clouston, who was accompanied by his mother, fell between the wharf and the steamer into the dock. There was scarcely a yard space between the wharf and the steamer, and it was feared that the boy would be crushed to death before any attempt could be made to save him. Without waiting to calculate personal risk, David Kennedy, the steward of the Boavista, jumped into the yawning space, dived beneath the wharf and rescued the boy. The mother was lavish in her gratitude to the rescuer of her child and the numerous passengers showed their appreciation of Kennedy's heroism by hearty cheer. While in the act of saving the boy Kennedy lost a valuable watch. A movement will be set on foot to obtain a Humane Society medal for the brave steward, and no doubt he will be reimbursed for the loss of his watch from other sources.

An incident in which a remarkable affection was formed between a child six years old and a cow, resulting later in an accident to the child, is told from a farm in the vicinity of Charlottetown. Some time ago the child, who was accustomed to play in the fields among the farm animals took a particular liking to a cow which she regarded as an attachment for the little boy. It would allow him to climb on its back while lying down and sit there unmolested from time to time. After this had continued for some days the child sought a more exciting form of amusement and securing a short ladder it climbed to the back of the animal and pushing away the ladder remained peacefully in that position in full enjoyment of its unique mode of locomotion. After being seated for some time on the cow's back a heifer approached and the former in warding off the supposed attack upon its youthful protegee threw the child from its seat with the result that it suffered painful injuries including the breaking of one of the bones of the arm.

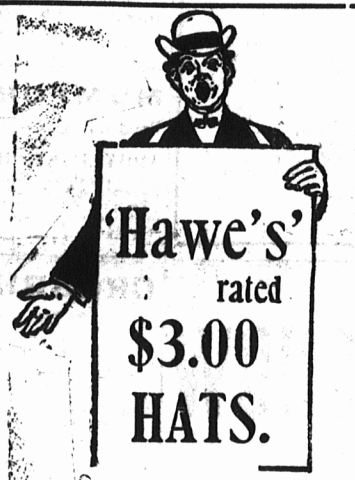

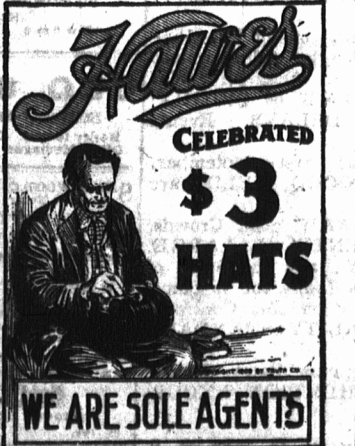
