Japanese Publisher Sees World War

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—(AP)—A prediction that a world war will break out within a year unless the Chinese-Japanese conflict is ended before that time was voiced today by Shingoro Takahashi, Japanese publisher of the Tokyo newspaper Nichi Nichi.

Takahashi is en route to Europe on a good-will mission. He said he spoke from knowledge gathered in conversations with Japan's war ministers, cabinet and prime minister, and declared, "Japan will not draw back a step. I can tell you that. We will fight Russia."

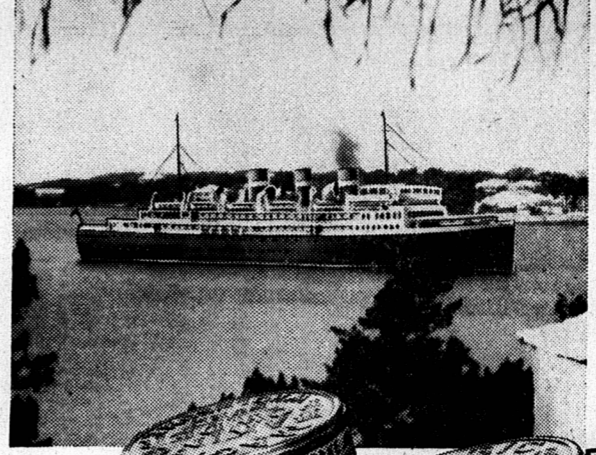
It was also decided to send a donation of food stuffs to the Prince County Hospital.

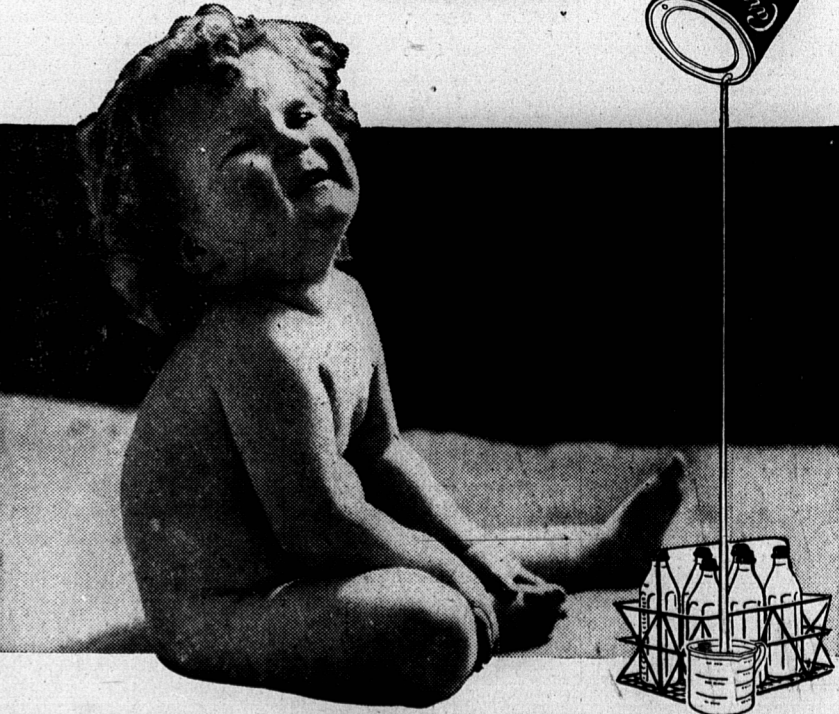
