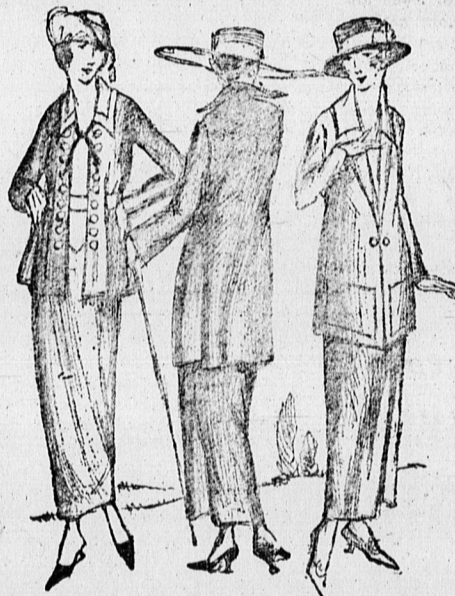

First P. E. Island Auto Show

(Continued from Page Seven)

cries are expected to be present today Mr. Coll, representative of the Good-year Co., for the Maritime Provinces was present for the opening.

The show which is free and open to all grown-up people will be open for one hour today for children—from 3.15 to 4.15 this afternoon.

The \$20.00 gold piece prize will be drawn for at 9 p. m. tomorrow night. The dealers are in no way eligible to win this money. All who are interested in this show should make it a point to be present.

Mr. C. W. Rogers, the well-known automobile agent, presided and introduced the speakers.

Lieut. Governor McDonald congratulated the promoters of the show upon their enterprise and referred to the changed state of affairs in regard to automobiles over that of a few years ago. He remarked upon the interest taken as demonstrated by the great audience present and believed that the show would result in improving business and disseminating valuable information to the public. He then formally declared the show open.

Hon. M. McKinnon, who spoke in place of the Premier, declared the Automobile Show a unique one. He referred to the change in public opinion in reference to the auto which in recent years. It was the history

of all great inventions when first introduced to be an inconvenience to some people, and to be derided by many.

It was creditable to the people of P. E. Island that when they saw the wonderful strides made in the construction of these machines and their usefulness that they receded from their former attitude and are now adopting them for use generally throughout the Province. Mr. McKinnon pointed out that the auto is capable of great good when properly used but can be the means of great danger when used in a reckless way. It was important that owners of machines recognize their responsibility. No one drops in the estimation of the public like the man who uses his auto recklessly.

Mr. McKinnon then went on to speak of the roads and said, the Government had in view for some time a policy to make a general improvement in the condition of our roads. He said there was no need to fear that speedways would be built. The idea was to improve roads from the remotest parts of the Province and the means of communication leading to the principal shipping and other important centres. Draining and grading would be done and in a few years the roads would be in a condition in keeping with the trade of the country. Aid from the Dominion Government would enable this to be brought about, the Island doing its share proportionately. Mr. McKinnon, speaking of the auto, said that a machine which served to bring town and country together must be a great means of good. The present show must be an eye-opener to many.

Mayor Wright for the citizens gave expression of their approval of the show and commended the courage and enterprise of the men behind it. Good roads must come when backed by the Automobile Association. He hoped to see many tourists come to P. E. Island when we have better roads.

U. S. Consul, Pierce followed with one of his characteristic eloquent addresses warmly congratulating the auto men for their "nerve" in pulling off this show. Mr. Pierce spoke of the wonderful strides being made in the world of scientific engineering, the marvellous engines, the power behind the engine, the triumphs of aerial navigation, and transportation achievements. "Subdue the earth," was the Divine command and man is engaged in the high and holy work of subduing it and bringing it to his use. In time he will have the tides of the ocean yielding power and when the powers of earth, sea and air are all under his control, it will be a time very much to be enjoyed by the peoples of the earth.

Mr. Rogers for the auto dealers thanked the different speakers for their excellent addresses and said that next year they hoped to put on a show far surpassing the present one.
