They are Eleanor McQuaid of Richmond and Margaret Carruthers of Augustus Cove. Neither of these young women has ever before visited Toronto or the Exhibition.

The P. E. I. girls as well as students from the other provinces, including Newfoundland, were chosen both for scholastic standing and all-round abilities. They will be given a civic reception by the Mayor of Toronto at the City Hall, officially welcomed to the Exhibition by the President, Col. K. R. Marshall, speak at a private luncheon given by the Women's Division in their honour, be the guests of Patty Conklin in the midway, visit Niagara Falls, go on an escorted tour of Toronto and finally be guests at a coffee party being given for them by Mrs. Ray Lawson, wife of the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario. Before returning home, they

will also make recordings of what they have seen for their local radio stations and prepare reports for their home newspapers.

Eleanor McQuaid's record has been outstanding throughout. She has been the winner of the Governor-General's bronze medal for general efficiency in Grade ten, a provincial scholarship to Prince of Wales College, the J. D. Seaman Memorial Prize for English in the entrance examinations to Prince of Wales College and the Governor-General's bronze medal awarded to the student considered best qualified to teach. She has also distinguished herself in debating, dramatics and singing.

Miss Carruthers stood second this year at the Prince of Wales Training College. She was the winner of the Bell Scholarship, a Prince of Wales College prize and a special award for debating. She has a valuable asset to the town, and a warm welcome is always awaiting them on their all too infrequent visits.
