TO TEST THEM OUT—More than a thousand cases of lobsters, each packed and prepared differently from the succeeding ones, are being put up at Borden, under the direction of Principal Harrison of Macdonald College, Montreal, who is carrying on research work among Canadian fisheries for the Dominion Government. The lobster search work is being conducted by the government in an effort to ascertain why and how so many lobsters, last season's catch, proved inferior when prepared for the table. After the investigation at Borden is completed, Principal Harrison, will proceed to St. Andrews-by-the-Sea, N. B., where he will put into practice a theory that is intended to eliminate the red worm pest which has so greatly affected the cod catches during the last few years.

Governor-General Byng Makes Soldier's Speech

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 29.—Gov. Gen. Lord Byng addressed the Canadian Club here today and received a great ovation. I know no word in any language he said in opening to express my gratitude for your greeting. I will only use three words and those are, "I thank you gentlemen." He proceeded, "I will never write a book, I promise you that. You will recall that Thomas Hooker wrote a book called the Levitain in which he lauded the divine right of kings. If ever I were tempted to write a book it would be the divine right of Byngs. One of these would be that they should never have to make speeches for I tell you frankly they can't heat it and I wonder if you mind just running back in your memories to three and a half years ago, when I went to the corps, I found them a body of fine individuals but there are those who will bear with me that there was some feeling of rivalry between the different divisions. I don't think to quote the scripture it was bigger than a mans hand, not bigger than his finger nail, I spoke to the commanders and it disappeared. Then came the 9th of April, 1917, I want you to remember that date, it was on that date that the whole corps its four divisions went over the top as one unit on schedule time not as an undisciplined crowd but as one rank of a huge machine and took over its objective on scheduled time. They took those troops he continued, and when the day was done there stood these Byng boys unconquerable and proud of their great accomplishment, but now the war is over, so can we get that great big march of bustling Byng boys together and do as well in peace as they did in war, can we not get them to forget all the little differences of race religion or anything else and get them all working together for the common cause. Gentlemen, I am no modern Gideon, he eliminated all those who had no stomachs for the fight, Gideon then took his men down to the water and he eliminated all those who did not drink from the palms of their hands. Gentlemen, I don't care how men drink water, (laughter) no matter what we drink, ginger ale or not. We are all in that offensive, and let us see if possible if we cannot get all these Byng boys in a great offensive like that on the 9th of April. Then is Canada is perfect.
