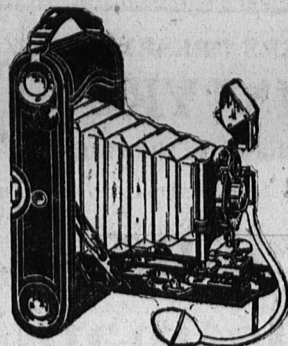

CAPE SERVICE.—The mail boats crossed both ways yesterday. The boats which left Capt. Tormentine at 7.50 a. m., had 57 sacks of mail.

SEALIA RETURNED.—The American yacht Sealia, owned by Mr. Henry Ford, which left this port on Monday put back yesterday morning on account of ice.

WEDDING BELLS.—The wedding took place at Waltham, Mass., on April 14th, of Harry, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Dunbrack, Halifax, formerly of this city, and Miss Hilda Burhoe, of Charlottetown.

C. G. S. PRINC EDWARD.—The car ferry steamer left Pictou at 9.20 a.m. yesterday and docked at 1.30 p.m. in Charlottetown. The steamer brought 200 tons freight and 58 passengers. Captain Murchison reports that there is now no ice between here and Pictou.

IN CASUALTY LIST.—Mrs. W. D. McIntyre, City, has received a letter from Miss Jean Gillis of Winnipeg, stating that Miss Gillis' brother, Pte. Clarrie Gillis, attached to the 42nd Highlanders, had been admitted to No. 14 General Hospital at Wimereux, France, April 19th, suffering from gunshot wound in the left shoulder. Private Gillis, who is a nephew of Mrs. McIntyre's, is a son of the late Dr. Gillis, formerly of Montague.

GRACE CHURCH SUNDAY SCHOOL bears the record by adopting seven prisoners of war, five being the greatest number adopted by any other church or society. St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Cardigan, has undertaken a third prisoner. The Dundas Baptist, Sunday School, and the Triumph Division of the Sons of Temperance, North West shire, one each. One hundred and thirty-one prisoners are now adopted by us.

TRIUMPH DIVISION S. O. T. North Wiltshire, has adopted a prisoner of war. This is the first friendly society to take action in this direction, but it suggests a large new field. Canon Simpson will be glad if other benevolent societies will follow the example set them by the Sons of Temperance. There are still sixty-nine adoptions required to make up the second hundred, \$4.50 per month is all that is required for the purpose.

PATRIOTIC WORK.—The Women's Institute, Springfield, Lot 67, are doing a splendid patriotic work. Every member being most enthusiastic. Meetings are held at the homes of the different members, thus sustaining the social life of the community. A circulating library is now in splendid working order. The members are preparing for the winter Red Cross work and after a busy winter of knitting are to turn their attention to making pyjamas, etc. for the soldiers. At a recent social the sum of \$57 was realized, \$20 of which was sent to the Belgian Relief Fund and the Institute is now going to adopt a second prisoner of war. Sister Fyfe was formerly with the Harvard Medical Corps who went overseas and performed excellent work in France. Upon the breaking up of that unit she returned to Canada and has been successful in getting a place in the C. A. M. C. Miss Margaret Fyfe, after bidding farewell to her sister will proceed to Newton, Mass. where her brother, Mr. Watson Fyfe, who was mate of the wrecked schooner, John S. Becham, is now stopping with his other sister, Mrs. McCallum, who is caring for him. It is pleasing to report that notwithstanding the awful ordeal through which he passed as related in last Monday's Guardian, his good hopes are entertained of his recovery. The other Island members of the crew of the Becham are under treatment in the Marine Hospital in Boston.

GOVT. POSITIONS BEING FILLED WITH RETURNED SOLDIERS

OTTAWA, April 22.—Before any progress was made with individual items of supply this afternoon the Liberals opened a general discussion of the changes made by order in council in the procedure of appointments to the civil service. Hon. Charles Mulroney, in a speech of considerable length, referred to them and laid emphasis upon the fact that appointments could now be made without reference to the civil service commission and without regard to age. The minimum age of 18 and the limit of 35 had been wiped out. He thought some explanation was due the house.

HON. DR. REID, whose customs estimates were before the committee of supply, pointed out that as the regulations stood formerly it was necessary for the government to take into its services men between 18 and 35. "I thought it was hardly fair for us to fill positions in the government service with men qualified for overseas service," he said. "The change had been chiefly made to enable the government to fill positions with men who had seen overseas service."

"I have since then filled every position with a returned soldier," he added.

SIR SAM RECEIVES REPLY TO MESSAGE

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, April 20.—Lieut.-General Sir Sam Hughes has received the following cable in reply to his message of congratulation to the Canadian troops at the front on their victory at Vimy Ridge:

Canadian Headquarters "April 20, 1917 "Your message of congratulation sincerely appreciated by all ranks. Canada's troops are proud of their achievements. Their gallantry was irresistible." (Signed) GENERAL BYNG"

HOW THE GERMANS FLEET WILL CONQUER.

AMSTERDAM, April 23 via London: "Will the Americans fleet enable our enemies to break our submarine blockade? The answer is most certainly not," says the Koelnische Volks Zeitung, which adduces a curious and cumulative argument, which it evidently considers final, that "The submarine cure has not been invented. Therefore it cannot be invented because there is none.

"It will be painful for us" the newspaper continues, "to sink good German ships, but we cannot be sentimental in this respect, and will discontinue the submarine business in fifteen days. The loss of German capital in that connection will hardly equal three days of our war expenditure."

The newspaper then enters into technical details of American battleships and hostilities concludes: "All in all, if our high seas fleet faced the American fleet in open battle, we would beat them very quickly and thoroughly. But this is unlikely because, before that is possible our submarines, with the mailed fist, will have imposed the law of world peace on the enemy and also on America."

PEACE PROPAGANDA BEING CARRIED ON BY SOCIALISTS

(Canadian Press) STOCKHOLM, April 22.—M. Stauning, minister without portfolio in the Danish cabinet, has arrived here for a conference with the local Socialists over the approaching meeting of the Socialists International committee to be held in Stockholm. The peace propaganda is being actively carried on but it appears to be almost entirely supported by the Activist and other pro-German elements, with the exception of a few of the most radical ultra Socialists, whose activities are inspired, not by partisanship for one or the other groups of belligerent nations, but by general "brotherhood of man" ideas.
