Upsets Feature British Tourney

Somerville And Clubmate Still In Running As Field Is Cut Down To 32 Golfers.

HOYLAKE, England, June 21.—(O. P. Cable)—In another day of upsets the field in the British amateur Title tourney today was brought down to the fifth round of 32 golfers and included are Ross "Sandy" Somerville, Canada's champion of the United States, and his London clubmate Jack Nash. Cyril Tolley and Roger Wethered, former title-holders, represent the biggest remaining British threat while two survivors of the U. S. contingent of six are left—George T. Dunlap and Douglas Grant.

"Silent Sandy", who has yet to be extended, will get some real opposition tomorrow. He is drawn in the sixth round against the lad who sprang the biggest of today's surprises, Edward P. Kyle of Singapore. Kyle eliminated the Scottish champion, Jack McLean, one of the favorites, one up.

And if Dunlap, the fair-haired New York youth and Walker Cup player, gets past the sharp-shooting Lister Hartley in the morning he will collide with Somerville—or Kyle.

McLean was not the only favorite bowled over. Also joining the defending champion, Johnny De Forest, on the sidelines are T. A. Forrance, last year's British Walker Cup captain, eliminated by A. S. Thompson of Aldeburgh at the 21st hole in the third round, John Burke, British Walker Cup player

eliminated by Nash and Alario De Forest, older brother of the deposed champion, beaten by Dunlap.

The performances of Nash were in some respects the feature of the day's play. While Sandy was getting an easy entrance to the fifth round with a six and five victory over D. J. Walker, old Cambridge University captain, Nash had to overcome two noteworthy golfers in Lionel Munn, veteran Irish star, and Burke. He eliminated Munn four and two and went to the 19th hole to beat Burke, in a ding-dong battle in which neither player was ever more than one up.

Brig-General A. C. Critchley, native of Calgary and holder of the French amateur title, was the latest Canadian to go out of the competition. J. W. Jones of Grange Park eliminated him in the fourth round by a two and one count.

Somerville was obliged to play only one match, in the fourth round, and was again in unbeatable form. He was only one stroke over par for the 18 holes as he polished off Walker.

The last hole was something of a freak, Sandy getting an eagle two on the 13th when Walker knocked his ball into the cup.

Nash is in the lower half of the draw and Sandy in the upper, so the Canadians will not meet unless it is an all-Canadian finish. Outside of Nash, Tolley would seem to dominate the lower brackets.

MONTREAL, Que., June 21.—Two young Montreals, Rene Gareau, 20 years, and John Griggs, 19 years, both Canadian National telegraph messenger boys are today peddling their way from Montreal to Toronto on bicycles in an attempt to break previous time records.

Loughran Comes Back Fighting To Win Decision

YANKEE STADIUM, New York, June 21.—Blood streaming from cuts over both eyes, every bit of his marvellous ring technique strained to the utmost to fend off a punch blazing youth, Tommy Loughran, the irrepressible veteran from Philadelphia, staged another of his famous come-backs tonight to even his score with slugging Steve Hamas.

With a crowd of 10,000 cheering his come-back in the final rounds after it seemed Hamas might repeat the knockout victory he scored in their first meeting, Loughran stabbed and jabbed and smarted his way to a 10-round decision, the second he has scored in his four engagements with the former football star from Penn State.

Loughran's margin was close but even the crowd that howled the decision a bit at the end seemed not to begrudge him the honors. It was a masterful display of boxing skill, ring generalship, and sharp-shooting punching that brought the one time "Phantom of Philly" back to the big wheel after it seemed once more that his career was over.

Going into the ninth round, Loughran's left eye lid was cut, souvenir of a right cross Hamas landed in the seventh, his nose was bleeding and there was a deep cut over his right eye. He seemed tired, about to go.

But apparently he was just beginning to fight. He called on new speed in the ninth and tenth, jabbed Hamas' head back on his shoulders, and ripped at him with both hands, fighting instead of boxing. Time and again he set the youngster back with clean belts to the chin that won him the last two rounds by the clearest margins of the fight, and with them the decision.

Loughran weighed 186 pounds, Hamas 187½.

Only Native Born Member Montreal Club

MALDEN, Mass., June 21.—Eric Noseworthy, 17-year-old Canadian born Malden High School baseball star, yesterday reported to the Montreal club in the International League.

The youngster's equipment for the long jump from the schoolboy ranks to Double A baseball is a .400 batting average and some flashy fielding in his school league. He will be the only native born member of the Montreal club. By turning professional, he has been forced to give up the captaincy of next year's Malden High nine.
