POSSIBLE RETIREMENT OF PREMIER BALFOUR.
May Accept A Splendid Banishment to the House of Peers.
—Chamberlain's Movements.

LONDON, Jan. 20.—Mr. Chamberlain's daily movements and speeches still fill the papers and inspire the leading writers. His energy is amazing. It is also clear that he has lost none of his power of magnetizing opposing interests by the sheer force of his own faculties. His freedom from deep prejudices and his obvious good intentions. Those who most hate Chamberlainism do not withhold such tributes as Lord Rosebery paid Saturday night, to his proceedings on his present mission. Yet behind these tributes of friend and foe there lurk uneasy questionings as to what use this remarkable man will make of his triumph when he returns to the hurlyburly of English politics.

It is significant that, while he is fitting victoriously up and down Africa, his one potent Unionist contemporary, Mr. Balfour, twelve years younger than he is showing painful signs of the effects of the wear and tear of public life. Mr. Balfour's frequent attacks of influenza and feverish chill are watched with some alarm, by those many followers who will accept no other, Unionist leader, because they indicate a feebleness of constitution ill-suited to the double strain of the Premiership and leadership in the House of Commons. It is suggested that it is not unnatural that the worries of foreign affairs and the signs of discontent with the Government at home, as evidenced in recent elections, notably at Newmarket, have depressed the Prime Minister, and made him peculiarly liable to the ills which haunt him at this season of the year. In a month's time he will have the added strain of Parliament. Already men talk of the possibilities that he may be forced by considerations of health to accept a splendid banishment to the House of Peers, retaining the Premiership, and placing the leadership of the House of Commons elsewhere. Then will come the tussle, for where else can he place it than in the hands of Mr. Chamberlain? What will the old Tory "rump" say to that? Meanwhile both Lord Rosebery and Sir H. Campbell-Bannerman are striving to galvanize Liberalism into giving signs of life. Lord Rosebery's outburst at

Plymouth, Saturday night would be more effective if it were followed up by the effective leadership. The only signs of that come from outside the ranks of the titular leaders in the organization. Against the Education Act the National Free Church Council is issuing a plan of campaign to 800 local councils, throughout England. Definite steps are urged, in each case aimed to lessen the ecclesiastical and strengthen the undenominational character of the schools, especially to report and publish instances of the introduction of Romanizing practices, all to pave the way for complete popular control. The council has handed over the non-payment of rates movement to a separate committee, and probably little more will be heard of it.

Though there is no record of the fact in the papers, a further prolonged conference of the South African mine owners was held in London. The general British taxpayer welcomes the prospect of forty or even of thirty millions sterling from the Transvaal towards the cost of the war, though many dislike bargaining with Cosmopolitan Jews about a British war debt.

"What," asks the Manchester Guardian, "is the Empire to a gold mine or a gold mine to the Empire? Is Empire only dear to international capitalization? Johannesburg in so far as it is useful is a commercial asset. When, therefore, thirty millions are placed on one side of the account many refuse enthusiasm until the debtor side is published."

Radical papers, like the London Star, see in cheap Chinese labor the Radicals' equivalent for the thirty millions. "It is," it cries, "the price of the yellow army!" Even the Times in a constrained impetuosity, says: "We do not undertake imperial responsibilities merely to run mines on the cheap. We undertook them to carry out our mission in the world, bear the white man's burden, evolve order out of chaos, and build up the state."

The Spectator begs Mr. Chamberlain to announce that the Government will refuse to allow Chinese labor, but will leave the matter to be settled, finally, when self-government has been granted.

THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

SIR,—A good deal of dispute has arisen through the press as well as among the masses of the people as to who is responsible for all the bungling and disappointment experienced by our winter service as conducted by the Minto and Stanley. It is a very easy matter to shift the blame off the shoulders of the guilty and talk even glibly in denouncing the innocent and although but a very obscure citizen without any influence, yet I will hazard the assertion that so far the blame has been far from being rightly located. Perhaps the very people most to blame for the partial failure of our winter service are the lowest in their denunciation of that service. But so long as corporations and Boards of Trade determine that if grain cannot be brought to their mills it shall go to no other mill the same state of things exists. It has been explained time and again that nature has done more to provide suitable conditions for winter communication by the Capes route than by any other points between this Island and the mainland and although the service only requires a distance of some 7 or 8 miles yet by the selfishness and greed of those who hold, or think or pretend to hold a certain voting influence under their control they insist of necessity drag the steamers over a distance of from 28 to 35 miles and that over a section of the every worst conditions possible to find, on the Island side at least. Every one who knows anything of the action of the ice, winds, and Misocyclone Shoals, must know that the making of Summerside harbor is the most unfavorable possible. That Summerside has the right to the services in the early winter, and again in the spring when conditions exist that render it safe from an experience such as we are now passing through no honest mind will doubt but surely there should be more magnanimity than to act the part of the dog in the manger. Let the people of Prince Edward Island unite in their demand to give the Capes route one good fair trial. If it has no other effect it will at least have the result of settling a much vexed question and of convincing us that the authorities are sincere in their efforts to carry out the terms of union.
