The Wets Marshall Strongly But Prohibition Wins Out by Small Majority.

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Oct. 23.—With one thousand polls yet unreported there is every indication that O. T. A. forces will be the victors of today's liquor plebiscite.

Early returns, mostly gathered from the cities and towns pointed strongly to victory for the Wets with a large majority. This majority however gradually diminished as returns from the country districts came to hand and later reports estimate that the Drys will win the day with a small margin.

PRINCE COUNTY REPORTS GOOD PROGRESS

After First Day of \$50,000 Drive for Orphanage.

SUMMERSIDE, P.E.I., Oct. 23.—After getting off to a flying start last night, Prince County wing of the Province-wide campaign to raise \$50,000 to save Prince Edward Island Protestant Orphanage from extinction reported a total for the first day's subscriptions of \$588.25 in seventy-five subscriptions, at the first rally supper held at six-thirty o'clock tonight in the Y.M.C.A.

William C. Lawson, Chairman of the Alberton Division, and A. J. Matheson, Chairman of the O'Leary Division reported tonight to Charles R. Rogers, Vice-President commanding Prince County that their respective divisions were hard at work. A meeting was held tonight in Alberton at which all the division members chose prospect cards, and at which several enthusiastic talks were made. Mr. Lawson, Grand Master of Masons of the Province, predicted tonight that Alberton would "swamp Summerside."

The Summerside Woman's Division reported a larger total for the first day's work than the Men's Division. The women reported to Charles Hensley, Acting-Treasurer for Summerside, a total of \$312.25, while the men's total was \$275. Miss Carrie Holman, Chairman of the Woman's Division, said last night that the women would retain their lead over the men, a statement which the men seriously questioned. "I will prove true, for they are out to 'pull the campaign over big'."

Last Minute News Flashed In Over the Wires

(Canadian Press) PARIS, Oct. 23.—The Premier of Italy and Jugo Slavic Foreign Minister are to meet, as soon as the Jugo Slavic ministerial crisis is settled, says Le Matin, for discussion of the Italo-Jugo defensive alliance. The principal aim will be to guarantee the status quo in Central Europe and maintain order on the Adriatic. The paper's Belgrade correspondent reports that the alliance will be signed when the sovereigns of Jugo Slavia make their visit to Rome.

FOUR MONTREAL MURDERERS PAY DEATH PENALTY

Sentence of Valentino and Davis Commuted To Life Imprisonment — Touching Scenes At Bordeaux Jail Yesterday.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—Two of the bank bandits escaped the scaffold at an emergency meeting of the cabinet this afternoon. The sentences of death passed on Mike Valentino and Leo Davis were commuted to life imprisonment. The death sentences of Morel, Serafini, Frank and Gambino all stand. Valentino and Gambino all stand. Valentino and Gambino had been executed with them and the execution of Davis had been fixed for November 6.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—The actual hour of the execution was known only to the highest authorities but orders demanded that all those officiating at the execution report at the jail by 11.30 p.m. while the permits issued to those few who will be allowed to witness the affair named the hour of midnight as the limit at which admission to the prison would be granted. From that hour, the gates of the jail would be closed nor would they reopen until all four of the condemned murderers had expired their crime. Eight doctors have been summoned to carry out the request on the bodies.

Afghanistan Rebels Have Been Defeated

(Special to Guardian) CALCUTTA, Oct. 23.—Rebellion in Afghanistan led by a pretender to the Emir's throne has been quashed by Government troops, with heavy casualties on both sides, according to advices reaching Calcutta. The troops were forced to burn many villages and to take other punitive measures. The pretender is taking refuge with a friendly tribe.

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, Oct. 23.—A tribute to the power of newspaper advertising is contained in the report on the first year of the "Eat more fruit" campaign, issued by the Fruit Trades Federation.

This is the largest co-operative fruit advertising campaign ever launched in this country, says the report, and during the past season the peculiar virtues of oranges, apples, lemons, pears and grapes have been brought home to more than twelve and a half million people in Great Britain daily, and nearly a hundred million weekly, by press advertising.

The success of the campaign is testified by letters from fruit brokers, shippers, wholesalers and retailers throughout the country, and by the fact that it has just been renewed on an even more extensive scale. By means of advertising it is hoped to make "Great Britain which today consumes less fruit than Iceland, the greatest fruit eating nation in the world."

STONED TO DEATH AS HE LAY ON OPERATING TABLE

United States Minister To Persia Gives Report On Death Of Consul Robert Imbrie

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—How Robert Imbrie, United States consul at Teheran, was stoned to death by natives as he lay unconscious upon an operating table, was related today by Joseph Kornfeld, United States Minister to Persia, just returned, who returned on the Leviana with a report of the tragedy which he submitted to the State Department at Washington.

"In Teheran as in most Persian cities," Mr. Kornfeld related, "there are numerous drinking fountains where are stationed self-concocted attendants who in the name of a Mohammedan Saint Abbas, solicit alms. At the time of the Imbrie affair there had gained wide circulation the story of a miracle that was reputed to have occurred at one of these fountains only a few weeks before."

"The story was that a native approached the fountain to fill a gourd with water. In the name of Abbas" asked the alms solicitor. "No, in the name of Bahal," replied the gourd bearer. Straightaway he was stricken blind for the blasphemy; then when he dropped to his knees and recanted with a prayer of apology directed to the Saint Abbas, his sight was restored.

"The fountain became the gathering place of thronged thousands, who tied themselves to it and lapped up the trickling water, or fought their way toward it and prayed.

The Fatal Cause. "Imbrie heard of this. One day he strapped on a camera and with his aide, Seymour, drove in a barouché to the miracle spot. Imbrie forced his way through the crowd to take a photograph. The natives surged around him, clamoring and he fled to the barouché and drove away.

"Behind the carriage the infuriated natives ran shouting 'Stop him! The infidel has killed four of the faithful and poisoned the waters of the fountain. Although he was not wholly in-
