HORTICULTURAL SEASON OF 1903 IN PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

(By Rev. A. E. Burke.)

Whilst Ontario and Nova Scotia, the two great apple producing provinces of the Federation, are rejoicing in a full crop of well matured fruit and their orchardists already feel the healthy exhilaration which comes with the easy and satisfactory turning of an honest dollar, we, in Prince Edward Island, are regarding trees in many cases entirely bare, and in general, only carrying a sufficiency of fruit to properly identify the variety. This is our off-year. But even if others have all the fortune and are consequently participating in the prices already high and likely to be higher, there is that marvellous world-market Britain has little of the home product, we are not at all envious. Turn about is fair play. Last year we had full and plenty and the anticipation of next year's bumper harvest is a pleasure already.

Besides, we are mere tyros in this business and are not as yet equipped to take out of all the great things it promises us. Organization in the shape of a Fruit Growers' Association has just demonstrated in every possible way, to the surprise of our own people and outsiders alike, that this favoured island is a natural apple orchard, and that if we only plant the right varieties and prosecute the work according to sane horticultural ideas, we can, in short, ship fruit to the heart of the Empire in such quantities and of such superior quality as to guarantee an abundant return. The plantations in bearing are, however, restricted at the present time, and the work of the hour is to extend their area and provide against casualty.

Protection is a common word in all mouths at present. It is as important to the apple interest here as it is to the other great interests of Canada. We are a small island in the middle of the Gulf of St. Lawrence; nature endowed us splendidly with a rich and varied forest; unthinking man could not get rid of it quickly enough; and, as a consequence, we are to-day windswept and exposed on every side. The forestry problem is, therefore, as vital to horticulture here as it is to the health of the produce; its water supply and general economics. Windbreaks grow rapidly and reforestation should be energetically undertaken. Then the orchard will bear its luscious fruit in rich clusters in safety till the garnering time.

PROGRESS IN PLANTING.

If it were necessary to say any word of "Horticulture in Prince Edward Island in 1903," it should be simply to note substantial progress in planting; better caring of the small orchards now in bearing and a diffusion of sound notions, very essential to the permanency of the industry. As to instruction, the people have accepted it in a splendid spirit and it has been plentifully and practically given. Professor Robertson, always our friend, has implemented the work of the association here by the instructor's visit. Since 1900, when we had the satisfaction of giving expression to it in the presence of Ontario's best horticulturists at Cobourg, we had held tenaciously to the pre-eminence value of the personal visitation over all other kinds of instruction for the uplifting and general extension of horticulture. By it we had reasonable hopes of transforming the Island into one big profitable orchard half a century. Professor Roberts on fell in with this idea readily. We have had then, thanks to his department, the services of instructors who travelled the entire province in summer, examining prospective orchard sites, locating windbreaks, explaining soil conditions, showing how the tree is planted, fed and cared for; pruning and spraying the old plantations and demonstrating in the matter of filling packages for shipment and storage. They have done an immense work which future generations will rise up to bless.

The difficulty now with us in planting extensively—and many, many thousands of trees have been planted this season—lies in the direction of stock. We take the major portion of our trees from Ontario and New Brunswick—this latter province dealing for a long time in nursery stock, although doing little as a province horticulturally. Our own nurseries are in their infancy. New Brunswick nurseries can give us standard stock in perhaps the best varieties to grow here; but stock from that province somehow never suited our conditions exactly. Matters in this connection, however, are improving; the schoolmaster is abroad and a great deal more of discrimination is discernable in recent purchasing.

SPRAYING NECESSARY.

We shall have to spray to get good clean fruit here, too. This year, with its quarter crop and a damp, cold, backward season—except for a second hatching of sodding moth something entomologist declared we would not suffer from—we have clean, unborer, if underseeded fruit. But the "spot" is here, and as the orchards increase in age and number, the pest must increase also. The only thing to do then is to prepare to fight them intelligently. The travelling sprayer has made his appearance amongst us this year for the first time; he will be invaluable to the busy farmer-orchardist, if he have sufficient skill and use honest mixture. When Prince Edward Island becomes generally planted out to fruit trees, and the day is not distant, assuredly she ought to be able to compete against her sister provinces in the market of the old world. The apples she produces are excellent—well formed, beautifully coloured, long keeping and flavored deliciously. They will certainly be sought after when their reputation becomes thoroughly established. They are even now wanted unrestrictively in Britain. With these qualities we do not fear the competition of Ontario

and Nova Scotia. But we have other advantages. Our fruit is a month later in general and we ship better. The Gravensteins, for example, which suffers so much from wretched transportation in its ever ripened state, will be in season here in cool October. Besides, we are nearer the British market. Prince Edward Island is at the very doorway; Ontario has half a continent to traverse before shipping is reached at all for Europe. Any one can realize then the advantages of our position with regard to the commercial side of this question; and after all this is the one that tells most. We, therefore, turn our faces hopefully to the future horticulture here, believing as we do that a vast industry is opening before us, an industry which, in a fair field and no favor, can hold its own against any other competitor in this fair Dominion of Canada.—Herald.
