Reminiscent

THE FIRST DOMINION ELECTION—EXTRACTS FROM AN OLD NEWSPAPER—CHANGES AND IMPROVEMENTS.

At this date fifty-five years ago the Dominion Election—the first Dominion Election ever held in Canada—was the absorbing topic. The Examiner of the 16th September 1867 remarked that all the Provincial papers are filled, to the exclusion of almost everything else, with the reports of the proceedings at the elections.

In New Brunswick the elections had not all been held. But the Hon. J. H. Gray, one of the Fathers of Confederation had been elected by acclamation and election of Hon. W. Tilley—afterwards Sir Leonard Tilley—was assured. New Brunswick, indeed returned a considerable majority of its representatives in the House of Commons to support the Liberal Conservative Party. Then, as now, the policy of New Brunswick was to be "in line" with the majority at Ottawa, Nova Scotia was obdurate. Only Dr. Tupper—afterwards Sir Charles—was elected in support of the Conservative Party upon the first appeal to the constituencies of the Dominion as then constituted. Prince Edward Island was still out in the cold, a mere Colony under the supervision of the officials in Downing Street.

Proof of this fact is found in the Examiner's report that the Hon. W. Hensley, Attorney General having been a passenger on R. M. S. China, arrived in town during the past week and as one result of his visit to London he was successful in getting a remission of the Imperial claim for garrison charges. But of his success in pleading the cause of the tenants against their absentee proprietors and in obtaining a loan to enable the government to buy one of the proprietor's estates, nothing is stated.

The Examiner of this date, 1867 reported that Miss Sullivan, the proprietor of a large estate had visited the Island and remarked "Whatever immediate impressions she may have formed by a personal inspection of the state of her tenantry, there is no doubt that they have been greatly cheered by the presence of their landlord and that her own generous nature will prompt her to devise improvements as to the management of the estate and amelioration in the condition of the settlers." Such language in a newspaper of today would be strange to the eyes of the Free and Independent farmers of this Province of whom it may now be said that each manages his own "estate" and owes no tribute to any absentee proprietor—lady or gentleman!

The marriages announced in this issue of The Examiner included those of the late Thomas Kelly, Esquire—afterwards Judge Kelly, of Prince County—and Miss Mary Elinor Eskildson; Robert Galbraith and Miss Harriet Boswell; Theophilus Bearstone and Miss Elizabeth; David Irving and Miss Ann Tweedy. The families resulting from these unions are well known. Members of at least one or two of them occupy honored and prominent positions in their native island and in Canada and the United States.

Alfred Scatlon, St. Mary's A.A. won the Harbor Championship for single shells over the North-West Arm course yesterday in 10 minutes and 20 seconds.
