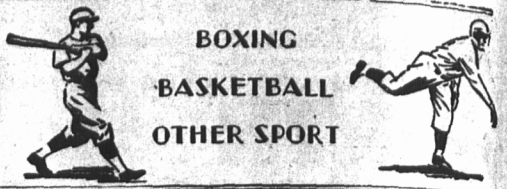

Bees Defeat Giants 7-2 For Fifth Straight Win To Capture League Lead

Lowly Leafs Halt Giants, Royals Lose

NEW YORK, May 1.—Right-hander Bill Posedel, making his first start of the season after two relief jobs, turned in a four-hit pitching performance today to whip the New York Giants 7-2 and shoot Boston Bees into the National Baseball League lead on the strength of their fifth straight victory.

Posedel, who was with Brooklyn last year, had a one-hit shutout going into the ninth. Then three singles and an error by Tony Cucinello combined to give the Bees their fifth straight win.

The Bees started early to put the game in the bag. Singles by West and Garms in the first frame produced one run, and they got two more off Slick Castelman in the second.

Johnny Rizzo's bat and spectacular pitching by Truett (Ripper) Sewell snapped Pittsburgh's eight-game losing streak as the Pirates beat Cincinnati Reds 2-1.

The speedy young Pirate left-fielder drove in both of his mates' runs in the eighth inning, scoring seven runs in the eighth inning, Newark Bees came from behind to register a 13-8 victory over Montreal Royals.

The Bees rapped out 12 hits and gathered eight walks off four Montreal pitchers. Two of the blows were homers, by Bill Holm with one aboard in the fifth and by Mike Charak in the seventh.

The Royals, however, stole the home run glory. Art Parks, Christ Hartje and Maurice Van Robays hitting for the circuit to help Montreal to a six-run lead going into the fifth.

Racing Fans Gather For Derby Classic

COLESVILLE, May 1.—(AP)—Derbytown perked up its ears tonight as the vanguard of the annual crowds which head for this racing capital to see the Kentucky classic began to pour in from all sides.

As hotel business picked up with each arrival among the 60,000 to 90,000 expected to see Saturday's 86th renewal of the historic 1-1-4 mile, most veteran horsemen predicted the event, booked up in a two-hour affair, between William Woodward's Johnstown and Herbert Woolf's technician.

Even the derby boys agreed with that theory. Latest odds made it appear all but these two likely choices, tougher competition, Challendon, might just as well have stayed at home.

One St. Louis quotation listed Johnstown, six-length winner of last Saturday's woe memorial at Jamaica, at even money, and his biggest price was 2-1 to 1. Technician, working well here in the blue grass since winning the flamingo in Florida was rated at odds of from 3 to 4-1-2.

Challendon, generally, was conceded about as much chance as William Ziegler, Jr.'s El Chicago, which arrived at the Downs today with Trainer Matt Brady, while scattered support was forthcoming for the Earl Sande-trained Heather Broom, W. E. Soding's Mite, Mrs. Bessie Franzini's mud-running Xalpa Clown and Junius W. Bell's Steel Heels.

Derby decoration broke out in parts of the city today. Banners bearing pictures of horses and other symbols of this "big week" in the blue grass were strung overhead, the main thoroughfares, and knots of horsemen argued the relative merits of the candidates.

A small, six-length prospect for the call to the post in the run for the roses, with the chances of a long run, was the 10-year-old gelding, when Technician's stable mate, Lawrin, won the Pot of Gold.

Canadian Golfers Lack Competition States Horne

MONTREAL, May 1.—(CP)—A good many years have passed since a home-brew golfer has won the Canadian Open Golf crown, but youthful Stanley Horne, one of the Dominion's shining links lights, predicted a break in that outside rule "within five years" if Canadian golfers obtain the proper competition.

Although only 27, Horne has held the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association title for the past three years and many believe he is the man to stop the steady run of success set up by golfers from the United States in the Open. The last which will be played for this year at Saint John, N. B.—was in pre-war days.

"We have the golfers," said the English-born Horne, "but they need more competition, tougher competition, to turn the trick. Fellows like Bobby Gray (of Toronto) and Jules Huot (of Quebec) are just as good shotmakers as the Americans. All they need would be winter play for several seasons down south and we could bring that little back."

Returned only recently from a month in the southern United States, where he played in three tournaments, Horne said he would like to make the complete winter circuit if possible next year and figured he could "clear expenses on the trip."

"And that's something," he added, "that only about 15 or 20 of the top flight American stars are able to do."

Horne said he and Huot often had talked of getting two other professionals and agreeing to touring the winter circuit as a foursome, pooling their winnings on the trip. "I'm certain we could make enough to get by. Even if we lost a bit it would be valuable experience and would stand us in good stead when we came back to Canada."

White Sox Belt Dean To Defeat Cubs 4-1 In Stratton Benefit

CHICAGO, May 1.—(AP)—Monny Stratton won upwards of \$25,000 and Dizzy Dean lost a ball game today.

Chicago White Sox, for whom Stratton pitched last year, knocked Dean out of the box and won an exhibition intra-city game 4-1.

All receipts from 25,594 spectators went to Stratton, whose gameness and courage after he lost his leg in a hunting accident last November inspired the benefit game. The Sox belted Dean and his \$185,000-arm out of the box after four innings. It was Dean's first turn on the mound this season.

Dizzy, tossing his famous "nothing" ball, was no mystery to the American Leaguers. After giving up only one hit in the first two innings, he lost control of the situation in the third and was touched for four hits and three runs.

John Whitehead went the route for the Sox, scattering the Cubs' 10 hits and pitching shutout ball for the first six innings.

Vice President Harry Grabner of the White Sox said Stratton would realize "between \$25,000 and \$30,000" out of the game. Every body paid, including reporters, umpires and players, Stratton also receiving the "take" from all concessions.

Before the game, the six-foot four Texan, now a White Sox coach with a wooden leg, posed for the news reel cameramen and photographers with Cub Manager Gabby Hartnett and then received a motor car from a former teammate, Tony Piet.
