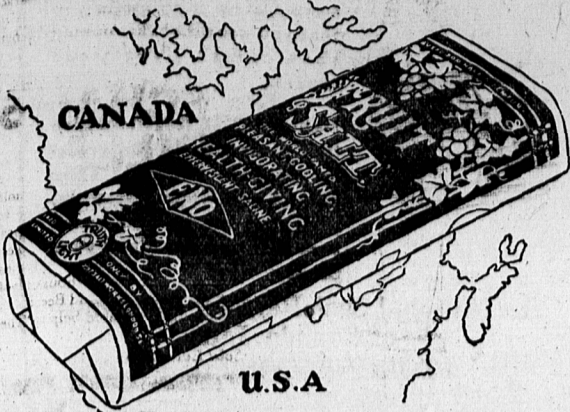

Dr. McNeil mentioned their physical limitations, and charged them to keep themselves in good health. His second point was their material aspirations. He charged them to continue their studies, his third point was their spiritual possibilities, and he charged them to keep in touch with God, through His Word and prayer, and then entrust the spirit in order that their ministry might be to the glory of God.

**Church Contributions Increase**  
Rev. C. T. Clarke presented the report of the Board of Promotion and Finance. Two meetings of the board have been held. The appointment of Miss M. B. Alward as Denominational Funds Treasurer was voted unanimously, in spite of the severity of economic pressure. The contributions of the churches, apart from legacies, exceeded those of previous years by \$3,012.28. Considerable credit was due to the aggressive work of Rev. H. R. Boyer, who as Executive Secretary, has been continuously in the field.

For the ensuing year it is proposed to stress evangelism and stewardship. Contributions asked from the churches to be \$75,000. A report was presented with view to equalizing travelling expenses of delegates to convention, but was tabled for a year.

Rev. H. R. Boyer presented a survey of his work. Ten conferences have been held, ten district meetings attended, and five associations. There is a necessity for conserving Baptist interests within the convention bounds. The past year has been devoted largely to denominational interests.

**Grande Ligne Mission**  
Rev. F. L. Orford read the report of the Grande Ligne Mission. Feller Institute has enrolled 156, of which 93 were boys. In the graduating class of 1926 there are 13, ten of whom came from the Grande Ligne churches. The new building has been opened and appreciation expressed to the Baptists of Ontario and Quebec and the Maritime Provinces in the gift of Masse Hall and its combined adjuncts. Religious conditions have been most gratifying. More than thirty of the students have made profession of Christ. The preaching profession has been augmented by the addition of Mr. Gignere, a former Roman Catholic priest.

**Membership Drop**  
OTTAWA, Sept. 1.—The membership of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada is 105,912 for the current year as compared with 117,060 in 1924, and 121,842 in 1923. The membership was 81,687 in 1918. In the following years it rose to 173,778 in 1922 and has declined since that year. The total receipts for 1925 were \$23,274.11, total expenditure \$20,938.34 and the balance \$2,335.77. The financial report was presented to the Congress convention this afternoon.

The service on Sunday afternoon was held under the auspices of the Board of Religious Education. Rev. G. C. Warren spoke on the subject, "Need and Importance of Teacher Training." He touched upon the steps which were taken nearly 100 years ago, to provide training for ministers. We need not less services, but more service. **Teacher Training Problems**

### Western Missions

The report prepared by Dr. H. G. Melick on Western Missions, was read by Rev. L. E. Ackland. The great west is a vast mission field. There are 1,000,000 new Canadians from fifty countries. There were 250 churches and 1,215 were baptised. Baptist sars doing a splendid work among the foreigners. Mention was made of the value of Brandon College to the western work.

Dr. E. D. King presented the case of the Cornwallis Street Church, making an appeal for sympathetic co-operation in assisting it to carry out its campaign. Rev. W. A. White spoke in support of this appeal. The convention then passed a motion expressing sympathy with this appeal.

A motion of sympathy was ordered sent to Rev. H. G. Melick, D. D. in view of his serious illness.

**Church Vacation School**  
Rev. H. E. Allay, of Berwick followed with an address on, "The Church Vacation School." Its value lay in occupying the boys under twelve years of age, during the period when they have nothing to occupy their minds. Leaders and Materials are usually found in the community. Originally, the programme consisted mainly of hand work. To this has been added a brief period of worship at the beginning. A talk is included. This is followed by memorization of Scriptures. A few minutes of active games were followed by singing. Drama was also used, and the last half hour devoted to hand work, all in keeping with the thought of the day. Experience has shown that children like it and attend well; that it teaches self control, and unselfishness.

The concluding address was delivered by Rev. W. C. Machum. A child must be taught religion in order to experience religion he said. More time and more effort in the field of religious education. Only one quarter the youth of the United States are being so educated. What of the three quarters? An answer is being sought in the "Week Day Religious Education" movement. Problems of supervision and teaching staff are met by churches cooperating and volunteer or paid teachers. This is no part of the public school system, he said, but should be held apart from and in a different building.

**Dr. DeWolfe Thanked**  
Dr. DeWolfe this morning gave his concluding address of the service on the Lord's Prayer dwelling upon what it means to pray in the name of Jesus. A vote of thanks to Dr. DeWolfe was passed by a standing vote.

**Church Contributions Increase**  
Rev. C. T. Clarke presented the report of the Board of Promotion and Finance. Two meetings of the board have been held. The appointment of Miss M. B. Alward as Denominational Funds Treasurer was voted unanimously, in spite of the severity of economic pressure. The contributions of the churches, apart from legacies, exceeded those of previous years by \$3,012.28. Considerable credit was due to the aggressive work of Rev. H. R. Boyer, who as Executive Secretary, has been continuously in the field.

For the ensuing year it is proposed to stress evangelism and stewardship. Contributions asked from the churches to be \$75,000. A report was presented with view to equalizing travelling expenses of delegates to convention, but was tabled for a year.

Rev. H. R. Boyer presented a survey of his work. Ten conferences have been held, ten district meetings attended, and five associations. There is a necessity for conserving Baptist interests within the convention bounds. The past year has been devoted largely to denominational interests.

**Grande Ligne Mission**  
Rev. F. L. Orford read the report of the Grande Ligne Mission. Feller Institute has enrolled 156, of which 93 were boys. In the graduating class of 1926 there are 13, ten of whom came from the Grande Ligne churches. The new building has been opened and appreciation expressed to the Baptists of Ontario and Quebec and the Maritime Provinces in the gift of Masse Hall and its combined adjuncts. Religious conditions have been most
