NEWS FROM VIENNA—The following is an extract from a letter dated April 11th, from Vienna, received by Rev. Canon Simpson, Charlottetown, from his sister, who is a resident there: "Today the bread tickets came in for the first time, everyone, rich and poor is allowed a certain limited quantity of bread or flour. This is printed on a bit of paper full of little squares and wherever you go to buy bread you must let the baker take one of the squares off. Even if you go to cafe or restaurant you must bring your bread on a ticket. The street car tickets have economical cooking receipts printed on the back. In every way possible people are requested to save, nevertheless, every theatre, the opera and every music hall is sold out every night. A man who keeps a night bar-room in the city made 5,000 Krona (\$1000.00) in one night. The streets are full of soldiers of course many wounded are about too. You can see the street boys playing soldiers and pretending they are wounded. They limp and run about with their sleeves dangling down empty. Today we are going out to dinner, our hostess will not have bread enough, so we must take ours with us. The police go to the peoples houses to see how much flour they have, and woe betide him or her who does not tell the truth." (Did not a certain person with a German name want a similar law in P. E. I.?)

A CHARLOTTETOWN NURSE—The Windsor, N. S. Journal, says: It is with pleasure that we announce to our readers, the cheering news that the Windsor Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society has secured Miss Ellen Seaman of Charlottetown, P. E. I., to represent Hants County as a Red Cross nurse for overseas service. She will probably sail from Montreal about May 20th. Miss Seaman is well qualified for the work. She is a graduate of the New Bedford Hospital and has had considerable experience. The Windsor Branch has now on hand about \$400.00 of the \$500 required to transport, equip and maintain a nurse at the front for a year. An appeal will shortly be sent out to the various Red Cross Auxiliaries throughout the country for funds to supplement the amount required. We trust that a generous response will be made so that nurse Seaman will represent as fully as possible every part of the country.
