ernment will be asked to attend the celebration, and of course a similar request will be made of some of the leading Parliamentarians of this country, of both parties. The Prime Minister, Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden, and the Leader of the Opposition, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, will certainly be invited, and it is likely that one or more of their colleagues will be specially asked too. Already His Royal Highness the Governor-General was specially invited to grace the occasion with his presence but it is not at all certain that he will be able to come.

A request is to be made of the British Government to send a warship for the celebration. Naturally a question that looms largely in the considerations is that of accommodation, and it is likely that a special sub-committee will be appointed to canvass the city in regard to this matter. To provide accommodation for the large numbers of people that will attend the celebration is certainly a serious matter, and it is engaging the utmost attention of the Committee.

Then, as already known, there is a proposal to arrange for the Canadian Athletic Championships, which are to be held here this year, to take place during the period of the Celebration, and the Committee also has this matter in hand. In fact, it received a delegation from the Amateur Athletic Association on the subject, but no definite decision has been arrived at. A sub-committee is dealing with the proposal. There is no doubt that the combination of the two events, or the merging of the Championships into the Celebration scheme, will make an event of almost irresistible attraction.

come by \$491,156.01, an improvement in the ratio of \$206,899.46. Our income in 1911 was less than 35 per cent of our debt, while in 1913 our income was 51 per cent. over our debt.

Another great change had taken place in regard to the auditor's reports on the public accounts, while in former days the more they probed them the worse they were found to be, while now the more they investigated them the better was the result.

In the matter of education, was it not highly pleasing to notice that this great question had been taken hold of? Although the efforts to make an improvement had been made only within the past two years the results so far had been highly encouraging;—a larger enrollment,

higher salaries paid teachers, a larger amount paid from the treasury than ever before, and the inducements of appreciation, as, for instance, the increase in amount of supplements voted, and a decided improvement all over the province in the interest in education taken by the people, and further the increase in the estimates for this department for the current year, amounting to \$177,005.00.

With regard to the Public Works, they had been told by the Premier that more money was spent in permanent bridges in the two years just passed than during the twenty years previous, and the substantial amount of \$35,000 in the estimate for the current year for this item was all news of encouragement. (Applause.)

Mr. S. R. JENKINS said he wished to congratulate the Premier on the excellence of his Budget Speech. He thought that the people should congratulate the Government on the manner in which the affairs of the province had been conducted, since the surplus shown by the accounts was a matter of considerable credit to them. The Leader of the Opposition had made a good many carping criticisms concerning the accounts, the delay in tabling them, and that sort of thing. The speaker thought that these criticisms were uncalled for. The Commissioner of Agriculture, in his speech on the Budget, had referred to matters of education on which he would like to make a few

remarks. The Commissioner had stated that it was the intention of the Government to eliminate Latin from the essential subjects of the Prince of Wales College. This was a move in the right direction, and Mr. Jenkins would like to see him go further and adopt a form of education more technical than that which was at present conducted in the College. Having given a scholar the rudimentary education necessary, they would be acting more in the interests of that scholar if they imparted to him a certain amount of technical knowledge, which in after life would be of untold benefit to him. As regards teachers, he thought that the preparation given students who intended becoming teachers was not adequate. As it was then rather late in the night he would move the adjournment of the debate.

On motion of the Premier, the House adjourned until 11 a. m., Friday, 17th April, 1914.

QUESTIONS

Mr. T. W. MACDONALD asked the Commissioner of Public Works what steps had been taken towards providing a bridge across McEellan's Creek at De Gros Marsh.

The COMMISSIONER replied that he would visit the district and look into the matter.

Mr. MACDONALD next asked the same member if he was aware that the roof of Court House in Georgetown had been in a very leaky condition for some years and that the interior of the building was being destroyed by rain and snow. Was it the intention of his department to have this roof put in order during the present year?

The COMMISSIONER, in answer to this question, said that he had visited the Court House and found it in the condition stated. This was a matter that should have been attended to long ago. The roof would have to be rebuilt with some lighter material, and this it was the intention of the Government to do.

Mr. MACDONALD asked the Commissioner of Public Works again if he was aware that the approaches to Seal River Bridge were in need of repair, and what action was being taken in the matter?
The COMMISSIONER replied that it was the intention of the Government in regard to not only Seal

River Bridge but other structures which had been built before the sent Government came into power, to have the work efficiently completed.

Mr. DELANEY asked the Premier if he had received a petition from John M. Martin and others, residents of Boston, asking for the appointment of a Publicity Commissioner for this province residing in Boston. What was the intention of the Government in reference to the said petition?

The PREMIER replied that the Government had received the petition signed by a considerable number of persons in Boston. The matter was still under consideration.

Mr. H. F. FEEHAN asked the Premier whether it was the intention of the Government to open any more roads for the use of motor vehicles during the present Parliament.

The PREMIER, in answer to this question, wished to say that it is the intention of the Government to continue its policy in this regard, that is, to open no new roads or routes except at the request of a great majority of the people using the road or route. The Government has always considered the public roads of this province as closed against motor vehicles, except in so far as the people may decide otherwise. The use of certain definite routes for motor trucks in connection with the Prince Edward Island Railway will be a matter of separate and specially favourable consideration.

Mr. PROWSE put to the Premier a question which had been asked by Mr. Doble on a previous occasion, whether it was the intention of the Government to amend the Prohibition Act at the present session of the House. (On that occasion the Premier replied that the matter was under consideration by the committee who had not yet reported thereon.)

The PREMIER, in reply to Mr. Doble's question which has just been put by Mr. Prowse and which I partly answered before, I beg now to complete the answer by submitting to the House the report of the committee who had this matter under consideration.

THE PROHIBITION ACT.
"A committee of the members of this House having had under consideration certain proposed amendments to the Prohibition Act has leave to report to the House and recommend that, in view of the great
