PREMIERS AGREE ON RESOLUTION

Which They Will Submit to Government Today in Secret Session

OTTAWA, Oct. 9. (Special.)—The provincial representatives reached a unanimous agreement this afternoon. Two resolutions were adopted. They will be presented to Sir Wilfrid Laurier and other federal ministers tomorrow morning.

The first of these resolutions declares the need for increased allowances as outlined in the Quebec resolutions of 1902, viz eighty cents a head of population of the Province as shown by the last census, an increase in the allowance for education and an allowance of twenty cents a head for the administration of criminal justice.

This is unanimously agreed to without prejudice to the claim of any Province to special consideration, owing to its peculiar claim for better treatment.

The second resolution declares that pending an amendment to the British North America Act necessary to give effect to the first resolution, the Canadian Parliament should at its next session enact a measure for the temporary relief of the Provinces.

The saving clause at the end of the first resolution is for the benefit of Ontario, Prince Edward Island and British Columbia.

Premier Whitney does not want to subscribe without some reservation to the Quebec resolutions because he criticized it when Premier Ross laid it on table of the Ontario House in 1903. However, Hon. Mr. Whitney wants money from the Dominion as much as do any of the Ministers for smaller Provinces.

This is for the benefit of Prince Edward Island, which has lost population and would lose money if paid on its present population. It is also a concession to British Columbia, which claims that the cost of administration of affairs in that Province, owing to difficult natural conditions, is far greater than in any other part of Canada, and that owing to the fact that the greater portion of its population is engaged in the mining, lumbering and fishing industries they contribute through the customs more to the Dominion treasury in proportion to their population than does any other Province. Hence they should have larger indemnity allowance than any other Province.

The Conference will lay its resolution before the Federal Government tomorrow morning. This will be done at eleven o'clock behind closed doors, as all of the proceedings have been conducted.

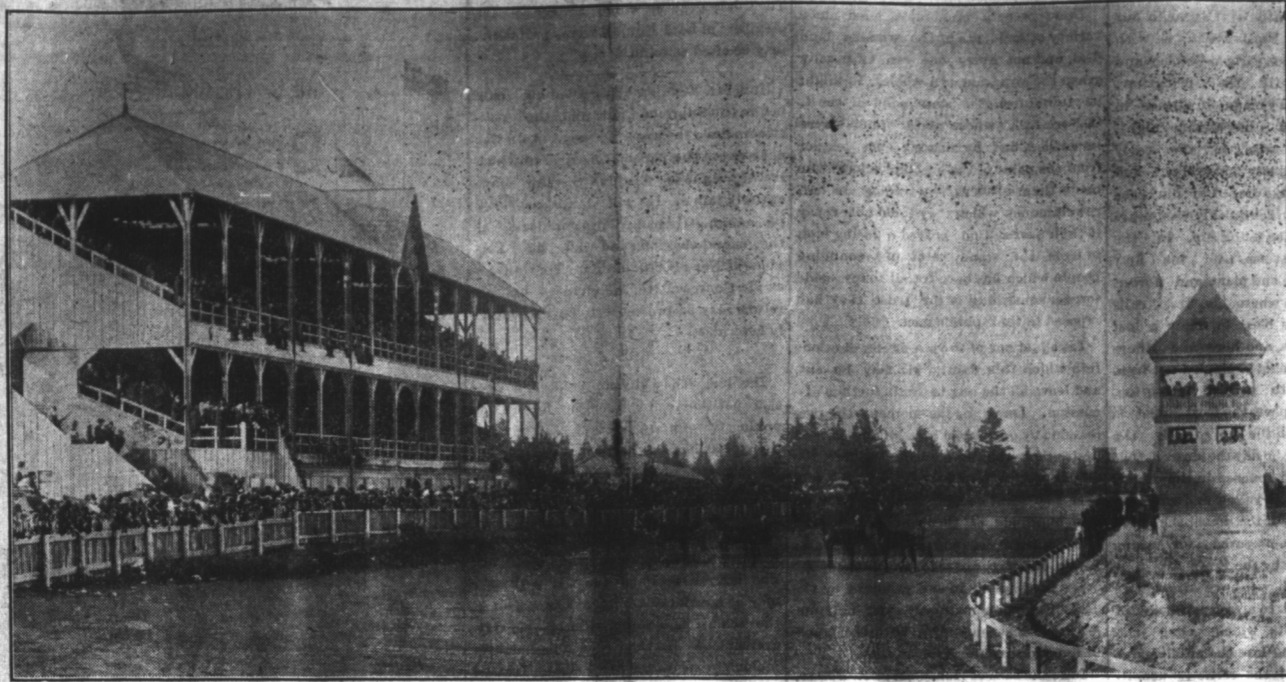
LONDON COUNCIL A SPENDTHRIFT

LONDON, Oct. 8.—Notwithstanding the discrepancy into which the so-called Progressive Party in London has fallen on account of the indiscretions and extravagances in which its representatives in the Borough Councils have indulged, there is no ground at this moment for expecting the party's overthrow in the municipal elections on Nov. 1.

Present indications do not justify more than a slight hope that the people who want municipal reform can [be] aroused to an active campaign against the Progressives, notwithstanding the fact that in every borough where the Progressives are in power the rates are steadily and rapidly increasing because of lavish and most unreasonable social expenditures. Enormous sums have been spent in the last few years by the Progressives for libraries, baths, housing schemes, parks, music, street improvements, street lighting, tram lines, and other things, so that the average rate in London has been increased about 50 per cent since 1890, and is now 7s. 6d. in the pound.

THE BIG EXHIBITION AND THE HORSE RACING

A Very Fine Day's Program For the Opening Day—Three Splendid Races—The Attractions Surprisingly Good—The List of Prize Winners As Far As Awards Have Been Given.

Everything is going along quietly and satisfactorily at the big exhibition and nothing remains now to assure its success except the weather which it is trusted will continue fine, Wednesday and Thursday have always been the bonny days at the exhibition, and it is certain, given fine weather, that greater crowds than ever heretofore will pass through the gates.

The Live Stock exhibits, especially the Cattle Classes have received, and deservedly so, great commendation—and it is no exaggeration to say that it has never been surpassed in the Maritime Provinces.

In all other classes of Live Stock, including Poultry, the exhibits are highly creditable.

In the indoor exhibits special mention might be made of the Cheese Exhibits, which is very large, and speaks volumes for this grand industry, which it is hoped will continue to grow and prosper, as none other in this province has done so much to improve the condition of the farmers.

To come to the prominent displays of their goods made by the Merchants of Charlottetown one cannot, as The Guardian has already said, fail to be struck with the clever arrangement of the different spaces allowed to them.

Strikingly noticeable on entering the building is the large section over which the sign of Prowse Bros., Ltd., is placed. Half of their exhibit is of furs a line in which the firm shows some splendid samples of the latest styles. Decidedly attractive and enticing especially to the ladies are the rich and comfortable looking sets of beautiful furs being hung up to public view. Set in by the Fur Department of this establishment presents a magnificent appearance. Also are shown a variety of styles in boys' suits—a most tempting arrangement which few would surely be interested in.

Although occupying not much space, the brilliant wrappers of Lapthorne's soap, out of bars of which a miniature house has been constructed, catch the eye, and bid the visitor to pause. He is forced to reflect that here is a local industry which should be kept in the memory without the aid of the printed card asking readers to "encourage Home Industry by using Lapthorne's soap."

Walking right across the Exhibition House, the stove exhibit of the Rogers Hardware Co., Ltd., appeals to all who have noticed the chilliness now beginning to be felt at night. Here, especially in Kitchener ranges, the march of improvement in stove making is decidedly marked. There are stoves to suit all purposes and all pockets and in addition to their attractive outside appearance they are warranted to do well the important work of keeping the house warm and giving satisfaction to good housewives.

At the race track yesterday afternoon a generous program of entertainment was provided. There was some fine trapeze work by clever performers, male and female, and their feats drew forth the applause of the grand stand. But what proved to be fairly surprising. MANY ARRESTS IN BUCKINGHAM

In Connection With Mill Strike Riot—Town Held by Soldiers

BUCKINGHAM, Oct. 9 (Special.) A dramatic scene was given to the situation here today by the arrest on a charge of murder of the Mayor, several members of the police and Alex. and Albert McLaren, proprietors of the mill whose men were on strike.

The strikers allege that the strike-breakers and police fired the first shot of the fatal riot and that the shooting was unnecessary.

The other side is not idle and three strikers are arrested on the same charge. The town is in the hands of soldiers and all is quiet, though more trouble is feared and the strikers declare they will die in defence of their rights.

AN EARTHQUAKE IN THE OCEAN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—The Weather Bureau have issued the following bulletin:

"The seismographs at the Weather Bureau recorded another earthquake, beginning about 9:55 p. m., seventy-fifth meridian time, Oct. 1. The distinctive features of the record consist in the long duration of the earthquake, and especially the long duration of the relatively strong motion.

"The amplitude of the strong motion, as recorded at Washington, was only about .03 of a millimeter, which is very much less than in the case of either the San Francisco or the Valparaiso earthquakes. The record indicates, however, that the disturbance was at a very great distance from Washington—in fact, almost at the antipodes, or within an indefinite region in the Indian Ocean, westward from Australia.

"There is every evidence from the records that this is another great earthquake. It would seem unlikely that it was especially disastrous, in view of its probable location in the bed of the Indian Ocean. It might, however, have been accompanied by strong tidal waves."

A BOY SHOOTS CONVICT DEAD

MACON, Mo., Oct. 8.—In a desperate effort to break jail here last night, Wm. O'Brien, accused of highway robbery, was shot and killed by the sheriff's thirteen year old son, Milford Graves. W. T. Tate, alias Leonard Knox, also charged with highway robbery, escaped.

As Sheriff Newton Graves entered the jail directly after supper he was attacked by Tate and O'Brien. O'Brien used a club and Tate a piece of lead pipe. The sheriff's young son caught up a rifle and shot O'Brien through the heart.
