Annual Meeting Of Dunk River Dairying Co. The annual meeting of Dunk River Dairying Co. was held in Central Bequeque hall on Feb. 8th with a large attendance present.

Production of butter during the last half of the year was very heavy and the total quantity manufactured during 1948 is an all-time record, being 5811 pounds higher than for the twelve months of 1945.

From indications to date it would appear that this winter's cream supply will be much higher than usual and this, taken together with a heavier butter stock carried forward, should obviate any danger of difficulty in meeting the demands of regular customers during the slack season now approaching.

At the annual meeting of the Dairymen's Association held last February the company's buttermaker, Mr. Johnson, was again awarded the prize for the highest percentage of First Grade Butter in 1947 and was second for the best kept factory in the Province.

The cooler room now in operation has not only effected an overall saving of more than \$100.00 but has also enabled the company to place its butter on the market in the best possible condition.

Junior Commerce Chamber Formed At Kensington

On Wednesday evening at Kensington the first Junior Chamber of Commerce in Prince Edward Island at the present time was organized with Mr. T. J. Ling as president.

The meeting of the citizens was largely attended and much enthusiasm was shown throughout. The meeting was called to order with Mr. Ling as acting chairman and Mr. Reginald Holman as secretary.

Mr. George Brookins introduced to the meeting Mr. George M. Henderson, chairman of the membership extension committee of the Junior Chamber of Commerce of Montreal, who outlined the history of the organization from its beginning in St. Louis, Mo., in 1915.

Mr. Henderson said that it was now represented in forty nations with over 150 units now in existence in Canada while a recent survey indicated over 700 communities in Canada which should support a unit.

The Maritime Provinces had up to Wednesday night, seven active units (Kensington making the eighth) and he felt confident of ten or twelve new units in the Maritimes before the regional convention date which comes in May.

Mr. Henderson also suggested that in Kensington young farmers should constitute a considerable percentage of the total membership as the national council is preparing a national programme on agricultural education.

In his closing remarks Mr. Henderson said "great is the heritage of every young Canadian but too few realize their good fortune. Hence we have a selling job to do, we must sell Canada to our own youth."

After the meeting had formally decided to organize, the election of officers took place and Mr. T. J. Ling was elected president with Mr. Reginald Holman as vice president, secretary, W. M. Cousins, treasurer, Fred Davison, Council, Lloyd Lockerby, William McLean, Don Baker.

A new pasteurizer was installed during the year. Both pasteurizers had been in service for over twenty years and the second one will have to be replaced before very long.

The steam engine was repaired and is now giving good service. The steam boiler installed last year is proving entirely satisfactory.

In the feed department the total sales from the dollar standpoint are higher than last year which was the previous peak. The total quantity of feed handled is, however, below last year.

Following the regular policy of the feed business this department was operated at practically cost, \$102,960.12 worth of feed was sold to the patrons.

The auditor's report showed the company's balance sheet in an excellent position. The net profit for the year, after reserves for depreciation are set up, provides a sufficient amount from which to pay a dividend and still add a substantial sum to the company's surplus.

Since from time to time it becomes necessary to make some further expenditures for factory equipment, etc.—such as the new pasteurizer already mentioned—the directors considered it advisable to follow a policy of adding a reasonable amount each year to the surplus. They recommended that the same rate as last year, 3%, be again declared for this year.

Highest Patrons The ten highest patrons for the year were: Colby Lewis \$3,590.14, Frank Jardine \$3,527.87, Scott Cairns \$3,319.15, Robert W. Hogg \$2,821.37, Roy Campbell \$2,803.84, William Sherry \$2,703.60, Edwin McFarlane \$2,695.10, Norman Murdoch, \$2,512.55, Ruben Large & Son \$2,472.80, Elton Cairns \$2,404.80.

The trophy for the highest patron was won by Colby Lewis. This same competition will be carried on next year with another trophy added to the patron with the highest production per cow average, thus giving the smaller patrons a chance to compete.

Twenty dollars was voted for prizes in the Dunk River Call Club. A resolution of confidence and appreciation was voted to the two butter makers, Melville Johnson and Orville Johnson, and the Secretary John S. Wright. Three directors retired and William Montgomery, Lloyd Waugh and Waldon Gardiner were elected for the ensuing year.

Continued from page 1 Toronto, were very proud and pleased at the way that the crews and the ships came through their first important test.

Left on Jan. 30 The two ships left Summerside on Sunday, January 30 on a tour of United States bases to give the members of the first navigators' specialist course, now undergoing training at Summerside station an opportunity of studying United States Air Force techniques and to talk with American scientists.

And whereas the nature of the project of farming does not permit sufficient opportunity for the proper keeping of records to the degree required for accurately reporting the financial operations connected with farming, it is felt by farmers that they are rendering themselves liable for taxes considerably in excess of the proper amounts due to their inability to protect themselves by records, etc.

And whereas the failure of the part of many farmers to be able to obtain definite clearance, within reasonable time, on income tax returns previously filed has caused much uncertainty and confusion.

And whereas the regulations now in effect place no premium on industry and thrift on the part of the farmer, thus having a tendency to curtail the productiveness of the farms.

Be it therefore resolved that this meeting record itself as being in favor of an early revision of the system of Income Tax as applied to farmers and that it recommend the substitution of a system whereby taxes be computed purely on the basis of income received in cash or kind within the year and that a standard production cost per unit of saleable farm products be allowed as expense, this standard to be fixed for each province separately, and that such relief be granted exemption up to \$1,300, and married men up to \$2,400.

then really began to realize the purpose of the course. He explained that the course is to bridge the gap between practical navigators and the scientists so that officers who complete the course will be able to talk to the scientists on a common ground.

On return they flew the great circle route and this took them over the route on a flat map but it is the shortest way as can be seen by looking at a globe. The average speed registered was 230 knots. The planes passed over California, Nevada, Idaho, Wyoming, South Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Ontario, Maine and New Brunswick.

Plan Trans-Atlantic Trip Early in March the same course will make a trans-Atlantic trip and later on they will do two weeks polar flying. They will make Churchill or some other northern airport their base for that time and will do continuous flying in the Arctic. This will be very important as it is intended not only to teach the men on course to navigate in the north but it is also designed for research into polar flying, to find better methods of polar navigation and to simplify it.
