MONTREAL, Aug. 28.-Following the recent severe cut in hog prices shipments were very much reduced and out of the 431 hogs received 244 were consigned on an F. O. B. basis, leaving but 187 hogs and 13 calves for sale.

The hogs were on basis of \$12.00 for lights and \$12.50 for end one. Those of good weights and the calves were practically all sold for \$13.00. There were no cattle and no lambs.
