A Patriotic N B Family. Among the New Brunswick families who have earned more than the ordinary share of honor at the front, are members of the O'Leary family of Kent County. This group enjoy the honor of having three representatives in France; all holding commissions in Canadian corps, of whom one has been awarded the Distinguished Service Order and another the Military Cross, for bravery in action. These three are Captain Fred A. O'Leary, recently of Campbellton, Lieutenant, E. Launce O'Leary and Captain Harry O'Leary of Richibucto. The first named, Capt. Fred A. is the youngest son of the late Henry O'Leary of Richibucto, and a brother of Wm. J. O'Leary of Montreal, of Bishop Louis O'Leary of Chatham, and of Bishop Henry O'Leary of Charlottetown. He enlisted as a private with the 26th Battalion, and while still in Canada took the qualifying course and won his commission as lieutenant. He transferred to the 104th Battalion, under Lieut. Col. Fowler, and after reaching England was drafted to his original battalion, the 26th, in France, in which corps he recently won the Distinguished Service Order and his captaincy. —St. John Exc.

IN MEMORIAM. ALEXANDER A. McDONALD. Another landmark has been removed in the person of Mr. Alexander A. McDonald, who died at his home in Allisary on Saturday the 16th inst. He enjoyed his usual good health until one week previous to his death, when he was stricken with paralysis, which, despite all that medical aid could do proved fatal. Deceased, who was in his 82nd year was a son of the late John McDonald Allisary and nephew of the late Bishop Bernard McDonald. He was a man of sterling qualities, honest and upright in his dealings and will be greatly missed by the community in which he lived. Throughout his life he had been an ardent member of the Roman Catholic Church and during his illness was attended by his devoted pastor Rev. A. P. McLellan who administered to him the last rites of his church. He is survived by a sorrowing widow, one son and three daughters, namely: John and Florence at home, Mrs. Victor Egan, Hillsborough Villa and Mrs. J. J. McGilvray, Blooming Point. He also leaves to mourn one sister Mrs. Catherine McDonald, Orwell Cove, besides a number of grand children. His funeral, which was very largely attended there being upwards of seventy carriages in procession, High Mass was sung by Rev. Dr. McDonald, St. Dunstan's, nephew of the deceased, while the obsequies at the grave were performed by the pastor Rev. A. P. McLellan, after which all that was mortal of a kind and loving husband and father was laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery there to await the final resurrection. The pall bearers were: Allan Morrison, Russell Clark, John J. McDonald, Daniel Birt, Joseph McDonald and H. F. Feehan. May his soul rest in peace.

FUNERAL SERVICE.—The funeral of Alexander McKinnon, was held from his home, Fredericton, on Friday, June 8th. The services were conducted by Rev. J. W. Hayter. There was a large attendance both at the house and at the grave. Interment at Fredericton cemetery. Deceased leaves a widow, two sons and three daughters, besides a large circle of relatives and friends, who share in sympathy with the immediate relatives in their bereavement.

SIMS IN CHARGE IN IRISH WATERS

LONDON.—Vice-Admiral William S. Sims, U. S. N., has been appointed to take general charge of the operations of the Allied naval forces in Irish waters. Admiral Sims will act in this capacity while the British naval commander-in-chief is absent from his post for a period. The official announcement of his appointment explains. The American Admiral's flag, meanwhile has been hoisted at the Allied senior office in these waters.

The text of the official statement reads: "During a short absence of the British naval commander-in-chief on the coast of Ireland, Vice-Admiral Sims of the United States Navy, has hoisted his flag as Allied senior officer in general charge of operations of the Allied naval forces in Irish waters."

A brief message from London today brought the Navy Department its first news of the appointment of Vice-Admiral Sims to command the Allied naval forces in Irish waters during the absence of the commander of that district. The department had no other information as to the new responsibilities placed on the American officer. The Wash-

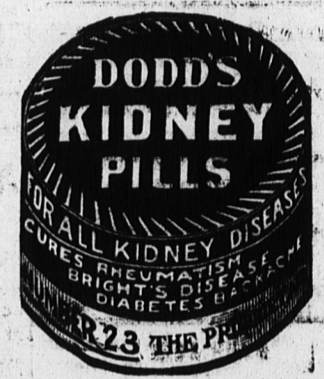
BRITISH PATROLS CLEAR OUT TOWNS

LONDON.—An official statement from British headquarters at Saloniki issued tonight reads: "Owing to the advent of the malarial season our troops east of the Struma have been somewhat withdrawn. Our patrols are active on the

east bank and have cleared Homos, Jenikel, Cuenak, Caydarmah, Elisan and Haznatar, which small hostile detachments had occupied. The ground evacuated by us is completely dominated by our positions on the hills west of the river.

"Our aircraft have bombarded the Poma and Tumba stations, east of Seres, Savjak, five miles south of Demir-Hissar, and St. Vrach, 13 miles northeast of Petrenki.

"British detachments are participating in the occupation of Thessaly and Piraeus."
