The Wesleyan: At the Centenary Church, St. John, the pastor, Dr. Howard S. Rags, was presented with a purse containing \$100 from the congregation on Christmas. Dr. S. Rags is well known in this Province.

Last year there were 21 vessels added to the list of Prince Edward Island shipping, the total tonnage of which was 1247 tons. This makes the total number of vessels registered in this Province at the beginning of this year 145 registering 12,457 tons gross and 9815 tons net. The vessels comprise—1 Barque, 936 tons; 1 Barkentine, 367 tons; 2 Brigantines, 360 tons; 12 Schooners, 5753 tons; 1 sloop, 20 tons; 1 dredge, 450 tons; 17 steamers, 1187. At the beginning of last year there were registered in Charlottetown 140 vessels of various descriptions, with a total gross tonnage of 12,457 tons and a net tonnage of 10,701 tons.

The prize list of the Provincial Seed Fair to be held at Summerside on Wednesday and Thursday, March 18 and 19 is to hand. The Fair last year was attended by about 1500 people and was considered a great success. The Judges, in their report to the Department of Agriculture, said they were of the opinion that it was the best Fair of its kind held East of Toronto. Of potatoes alone, there were 66 entries. This year the usefulness of the Fair will be extended. Additions will be made to the Prize List, and a Department of Household Science added. Classes will also be held in the Judging of Seed Grain, and in the Identification of Weed Seeds.

The Star of Hope Lodge, No 91, of the I. O. G. T., held a basket social Christmas tree, and entertainment, on Dec. 28th on the opening of their New Temperance Hall at Little River. Although the roads were very bad the hall was filled to its utmost capacity, and a good entertainment was given by the members of the Lodge assisted by Walter Richards of River View Lodge, who entertained the audience with some excellent gramophone selections. After the entertainment the baskets and the contents of the Christmas tree were sold by Elijah Blackett who performed his part in his usual efficient manner. A sum was realized sufficient to pay off all debt on the hall, which was built by the Star of Hope Lodge during the past year. The energy and perseverance which has characterized this little band of temperance workers in their enterprise is worthy of the highest commendation.
