INSURANCE FOR TOTAL ABSTAINER

One of the big life insurance companies is going to put total abstinence in a special class of policy holders, and if the death rate proves less than in the class where drinking is permitted, a lower price for insurance will be made them. Temperance and virtue have their own reward, but a tip on the side from the insurance companies will not come amiss.

The great ice-breaking steamer Yermak was built at the works of Messrs. Sir W. G. Armstrong, Whitworth & Co., and launched at the Walker shipbuilding yard, Newcastle-Tyne, in October, 1893. The vessel was the pioneer ship of what might be termed pelagic ice-breakers and as such it has excited a great deal of interest among ship-owners, merchants and others, the sphere of whose industry lies wholly or partly amongst waters which are at present rendered impassable by ice in winter.

Great hopes were entertained of the new vessel, which have been abundantly justified by the work she has performed. Built for steaming through the ice of the Baltic Sea, the Yermak steamed away for Cronstadt, where her arrival created great enthusiasm. She presented a sight hitherto unique as she steamed through an ice field 18 inches in thickness, with a good deal of snow on top, making a speed of six knots an hour. No ice, drift or field, seemed to offer any impediment to the new ice-breaker. The success of the Yermak has naturally attracted the attention of the Canadian Government and of all those people who are interested in the navigation of the St. Lawrence. So much so is this the case that it may safely be predicted that the time is not far off when we shall see ice-breakers of power at work and ensuring at least an early opening of spring navigation, if not an all-winter season. Of the Yermak it may be said that it is 305 feet in length, 71 feet in width, and 42 feet 6 inches deep. The hull is specially constructed to resist the crushing effect of ice closing round, while the vessel's four screws are arranged so that large blocks of ice may be carried clear of the hull. No fewer than three screws are placed at the stern, 'one in the centre as in ordinary single screw vessels, and the other two as in the usual twin-screw arrangement. The fourth screw is placed at the bows—not for additional speed, but to enable the ship to clear her way and keep lumps of ice from accumulating under her bottom. As may be imagined, the propeller blades, with such work as they have to perform are extremely massive, and are made of best steel of great strength.


