WASHINGTON, March 6.—The government today determined to retain control of the railroads despite the failure of Congress to provide funds for the railroad administration and to have the roads financed themselves for the next few months through private loans on the open market or through advances by the war finance corporation.

French Bound to Make Germany Pay (Special to the Guardian.) PARIS, Mar. 6.—The radical socialist group of the chamber, the largest group in that body, held a meeting today for discussion of the attitude it would assume in tomorrow's financial debate and unanimously decided that no tax should be demanded on the French taxpayers before Germany was obliged to pay the utmost she was in a position to pay. The group reiterated its former declaration in favor of pressing for the immediate disarmament of Germany.

We are all materialists in this, that we must first have the necessities of life, which now include much more than a century ago, then thought will be taken of the social and religious side of life. We have seen that the speedway does not add a cent to the productive capacity of any farm, but entails the employment of a huge tax, and as autos cannot be grown like turnips, or the heavens do not rain

gasoline, I fail to see where the sodier is going to get the wonderful uplift from the speedway. Very little has been said as to the cost of this speedway and even that little has been inaccurate and misleading. Concrete roads are not unknown, and we find that in Ontario concrete roads, are costing \$30,000 per mile. As our Winters are much more severe than those of Southern Ontario, a much heavier job would be required. Also cement etc is dearer, so I think we would be safe in adding a third to the cost in Southern Ontario making \$40,000 per mile or \$6,000,000 for 150 miles, which does not include a branch to Mr. McKenzie's. An Ontario government official gives \$200.00 per mile as the cost of maintenance and repairs for a 15 foot speedway. A comparatively short stretch of the Toronto, Hamilton speedway has already cost \$1,240,000. From the above figures it is evident that Mr. Cotton's Applan Way is likely to degenerate into a Via Dolorosa.

Will Mr McNevin, whose optimism seems to have run riot with his reason answer the following questions for the edification of a few of the tax payers of P. E. I.? How many years would it take to pay the cost of the speedway with cheese of the valuation of 1918? Butter? Wool? Potatoes? Oats? Pork? How does the total value of farm property of P. E. I. compare with the above cost.

What do our school teachers think of the mental calibre of those who advocate the building of a speedway, the interest on cost of which would double their salaries? I imagine I hear "22 short and a blank at that" Nero fiddled while Rome burned," is modernized into snobocracy went joyriding while our teachers starved. 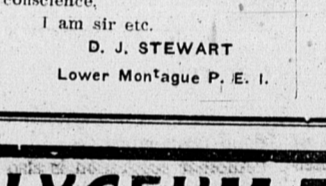

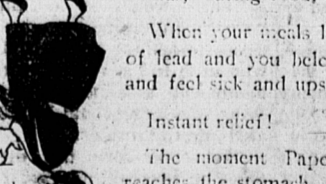
