

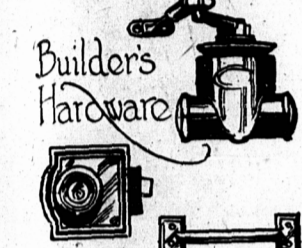

ZULU 'PROPHET' SEES VISIONS JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, Nov. 17—(British United Press)—A native prophet, who is reported to have had visions as compelling as those of Joan of Arc, has arisen in Zululand, and has already converted to Christianity more than 30,000 men, women and children.

This new prophet is named Shembe. A restless little old man with a strong personality, he never sleeps more than two hours out of the twenty-four. Even tough old warriors, survivors of the savage days of Dingaan, who have resisted all the efforts of the white missionaries, have been completely won over by Shembe.

Much of his success lies in the fact that he has adapted the methods of the Biblical prophets to modern times. He teaches by original parables which he borrows from the workaday world of the Zulus, and he encourages his followers to sing their folk songs and perform their ancient dances, then he neatly converts their barbaric promptings into spiritual fervor.

One of Shembe's doctrines is that it is not necessary to wear European trousers in order to be a Christian. His male converts accordingly wear check kilts, together with a white surplus, white collar and black tie. The womenfolk band their hair with white ribbon, from which falls a white bridal veil. The rest of their apparel consists of a long black skirt and white blouse.
