Touring Western Team Is Beaten By Wolverines 1-0

Second Period Goal By Gagnon Gives Halifax Squad Hard-Earned Victory — Wolves Display Speed Galore.

HALIFAX, Nov. 13.—A lone tally eked out early in the second period spelled defeat for Winnipeg All-Stars at the hands of the renovated Halifax Wolverines before 2,500 people in the Forum here tonight.

The touring exhibitionists gave Halifax fans their first view of the intricacies of the forward pass but play generally was ragged and the Westerners appeared tired. They shone on defence work, however, and McQuade stood up against incessant hammerings from the speedy Halifax forward line which continually outpaced the visitors.

Picking up a snappy pass from Bill Cowley, Paul Gagnon, the flashing Frenchman only recently from Montreal, fired at McQuade from close range and the puck shot into the net. The Winnipeg goalie for a while was kept busy responding to a rapid barrage from the "Wolf" forwards and was acclaimed by the crowd for several spectacular stops.

Apart from the speed demonstrations by the Wolverine forward line the game lacked the usual punch and at times Halifax appeared non-plussed by the new brand of play.

Apparently weary from the train ride, the Winnipeggers slowed down considerably in the third period and kept juggling the front line each time the Wolves would install a new forward trio. But in the rear they had almost an impregnable line despite continual play in this quarter. They tried, however, and it was only the lightning-like antics of their capable net-keeper that blocked loopholes which opened wide on several occasions.

Only on few occasions did the Westerners threaten to even the count but they could not break through the Graham-Lavigne-Sargent combination.

With action reduced to a slow pace the game roughened in the closing minutes and Gagnon was struck by a visitor but the bell intervened in whatever was about to happen.

ted as an exhibit on his appearance in court tomorrow morning. At that time he served a brief jail term for being intoxicated and was released.

Police authorities tonight declined to reveal nature of new evidence recently uncovered but intimidated detectives had been working on the case ever since Arthur Morven found the 21-year-old girl, 15 minutes after she had left her tables in an Oriental cafe.

When first found it was believed the girl was not fatally hurt and it was at police suggestion she was taken to hospital for medical examination. She died seven hours later from a broken skull, part of which had penetrated the brain.

An autopsy revealed she had been beaten with a wooden club and a coroner's jury decided she had been slain by "an unknown person."

Witnesses at the inquest said they had seen the accused wandering along the street shortly after finding of the body. Others said he had entered a neighboring house, drunk, and threatened some of its occupants, showing them a club.

Ont. Comment On Bank Report

TORONTO, Nov. 13.—Ontario will not allow any infringements on its rights, in connection with legislation inaugurating a Federal Bank, Hon. W. H. Price, Attorney-General and Acting Premier, said in a statement issued today.

As long as the recommendations of the Macmillan Banking Commission kept banking within the powers which the Federal authorities at present possessed, there would be no complaint; but if it interfered with provincial financing and took away provincial rights to handle their own affairs, it would not be acceptable, the statement said.

Juvenile Delinquents

There was a further falling off in the number of juvenile delinquents brought before the courts in 1932. This is a continuation of the marked decrease shown in 1931. There was a decrease of eight per cent in the number of cases brought before the court. Major delinquencies decreased slightly less than three per cent while minor cases showed a fourteen per cent decrease. Nova Scotia and Quebec were the only provinces to show an increase during 1932, with all others showing less cases than during 1931.

Notes Export Improvement In Vancouver

MONTREAL, Nov. 13.—(C.P.)—The British, Australian and New Zealand preferential tariffs have greatly stimulated activity in the port of Vancouver said S. McClay and James B. Thomson, respectively President and member of the Vancouver Harbor Commission, in an interview here today. Both port officials are on their way to Saint John, N. B., to attend a conference of Canadian Harbor Commissioners.

A marked increase had been noted in lumber exports through Vancouver said Mr. McClay. Export of doors alone, he stated "has taken 150 men off the streets of Vancouver and put them to work in the last two weeks." Up to September 30 of this year, more than 100,000,000 feet of lumber had been exported through Vancouver destined for many far eastern ports. A decline, however, had been noted in export of wheat.

SLICES GOLF BALL FOR 300 MILE DRIVE

PORT COLBORNE, Ont., Nov. 13.—O. P. Seaman, Canadian National Railways agent here, sliced a golf ball that travelled 300 miles and came back to him. Driving from the ninth hole of the Port Colborne Country Club course, Seaman sliced the ball out of bounds. It disappeared into an open box car of a moving freight train. A few days later he received a package from Walkerville, Ont., containing the lost ball. When the station agent at Walkerville was presented with the ball by an employee he recognized Seaman's initials.

Speaking on banking practice in the Dominion Mr. Cahan said: "As the decennial revision of the Bank Act is now approaching, a very considerable propaganda has been instituted throughout Canada against the banks and existing banking methods. It is claimed that the banks have usurped the prerogative right of the government to create and issue money; that their issues of 'credit' money have reduced government money to a trivial proportion of the whole; that loans or advances by which such credit money is created bear variable but usually high rates of interest, although no money is actually advanced by the banks to their customers."
