Turgeon in a speech last night pointed out that the people of Western Canada were not asking for free trade, but they were opposed to a high protective tariff and asked that agriculture should be freed from the burden of paying taxes for the protection of other industries.

The Saskatchewan Attorney General declared that the tariff commission had been appointed in a spirit of opposition to tariff reform. It was a commission whose hands were tied. They were being sent out, to quote the words of Mr. McLeigh himself, with the object of providing for the further expansion of the manufacturing industries. Mr. Turgeon stated that the future welfare of the country lay not in the development of the natural resources of the country and greater production of the basic industry agriculture. A high protective tariff, he pointed out served to impede this progress.
