

Annual Meetings of Women's Institutes

Mt. Carmel.—Seven regular meetings were held during the year, with a total membership of 38. Total receipts, \$78.02. Part of this money was raised by the holding of an Egg-Day. A quilt was made by the members. \$3.00 was spent on the School Examination. An amount of money was spent on supplies for a poor family.

Elmira.—Regular meetings were held with an average attendance of 14, and a total membership of 44. Receipts for the year were \$129.43. Part of this was raised by the holding of an Ice Cream Social. \$10.00 was sent to each Orphanage. \$12.50 was given towards the Hospital Fund. Prizes were offered to the school children. A new gate was bought for the School yard, also lumber, varnish and a map. Sign Boards were placed at the cross roads, at the expense of the club.

East Point.—Fifteen meetings were held during the year. Total receipts, \$38.89. This was raised by the holding of a Pie Social and a Party. \$6.00 was spent on the School Fair and \$10.00 donated to the Hospital Fund. A box of clothing was sent to the children of St. Vincent Orphanage. The remaining money is to be spent on the new school building.

Lot 16.—Regular meetings were held with an average attendance of 31. And the total membership for the year 27. Total receipts, \$377.25. This was raised by the holding of a bazaar and picnic, also a play was staged to raise funds. A collection was taken at all regular meetings.

Sea View.—Eleven regular meetings were held and one special meeting. The average attendance was 14, and the total membership 29. Receipts for the year were \$156.06. Part of this was raised by the holding of a concert and sale of candy. Repairs were made on the vacant schoolroom. Blinds were also bought. \$30.00 was sent to Mt. Herbert Orphanage.

Linkletter.—Regular monthly meetings were held with an average attendance of 18, and a total membership of 23. \$198.33 was raised by this Club by the holding of Socials and a Bazaar and by Donations. \$5.00 was spent on the School Fair. \$25.00 was sent to Mt. Herbert Orphanage, dishes were bought at a cost of \$8.50; quilts were made for the Hospital; \$32.00 was spent on School improvements.

Quon Mary's.—Monthly meetings were held with an average attendance of 19, and a total membership of 26. Receipts, \$77.73. Maps were bought for the school. Prizes were offered to the school children and maps were bought for the four schools. A moving picture entertainment was provided for the school children and they were treated with candy.

St. Nicholas.—Meetings were held each month with a good attendance of members. The membership for the year was 22. Total receipts, \$129.93. A Pie Social was held and \$47.00 realized, a prize being a quilt. \$40.00 was made on this. The woodwork of the interior of the school was painted. A strawberry festival was held in order to raise funds. Two stoves were bought and placed in the schools at a cost of \$27.00. Zinc for under the stoves was also supplied. Two wood boxes were furnished. A box was made up for the children of St. Vincent's Orphanage by the members.

Perth.—Eleven regular meetings were held with an average attendance of 15, and a total membership of 21. Total receipts, \$127.45. Two lectures were held and a sale of ice cream. One-half the proceeds of a concert held in February also went into the funds. Prizes were given to the school children. The interior of the school was papered and painted and the exterior was white washed. A new chair was supplied for the teacher and the equipment for the Hot School Lunch was bought as well as a wash basin, soap and towels. The organ in the hall was repaired and in the hall itself some improvements were made. The School was remodelled at the expense of the Institute, the northern part was partitioned off for a porch and playroom, and the walls of the schoolroom was papered with a fibre vaneer. The ceiling has also been painted.

Cardigan.—Meetings have been held each month with an average attendance of 17, and a total membership of 16. Receipts for the year \$439.21 raised by the holding of three concerts and Ice Cream Socials. Total expenditure, \$427.19. \$300.00 was paid for a piano for the Hall. The Hall was also thoroughly cleaned at the expense of the Institute. A Christmas Tree was supplied to the school children and gifts bought for it. An attempt is being made to purchase a life preservers to be used at the wharves and bridge. One meeting was given over to the picking of apples which were sent to the two Orphanages. The Institute is going to have automobile signs placed in conspicuous parts of the village. Help will be given financially to the War Memorial which is to be erected in Cardigan.

Roseneath.—Regular meetings were held with an average attendance of eleven. \$62.36 was raised, part by the holding of an entertainment. A gift of \$15 was made to the mail-driver. Window shades were bought for the school and a Christmas tree provided for the children.

Avonlea.—The Cavendish-Bastico Institute held regular meetings with an average attendance of twenty-four and a total membership of 16. \$99.54 was raised during the year. A festival was held at which a considerable sum of money was realized. One of the members of this club was made a school trustee. New maps of Prince Edward Island were purchased for both schools. Window shades, drinking utensils and paint were also thoroughly cleaned. A floral wreath was purchased by the club. It has been decided that a new hardwood floor be placed in one school, the Institute to pay half the expense of this.

True Blue.—Hunter River Institute held eight regular meetings with an average attendance of eight and a total membership of nine. Total receipts, \$533.58. An ice cream festival was held, also a bean supper. A play was prepared by the members and presented four times in different districts. Through the summer months ice cream was sold each Saturday and this money was added to the funds. \$7 was spent on the School Fair. A pump was installed in the school and a hardwood floor laid at the expense of the club. At present the chief efforts have been directed towards the improvement of the school property. It is planned that in the near future the Institute will help financially with the laying of sidewalks in Hunter River.

Cherry Grove.—The Cherry Grove Institute meet regularly with an average attendance of fourteen and a total membership of nineteen. \$90.98 was realized during the year. Part of this was raised by the holding of a dance. Three new desks were purchased for the school and a sanitary drinking fountain bought. \$15.00 was given to charitable purposes and \$15 to the School Fair.

Stanchel.—Regular meetings were held with an average attendance of fourteen. \$84.23 was realized during the year. \$58.00 was raised by the holding of a concert in Stanchel school. These funds are to be spent on school improvement during the summer months.

Sherbrooke.—Regular monthly meetings were held with an average attendance of twenty-four and a total membership of thirty-three. Two lectures, a bean supper, an ice cream social and a bazaar were held during the year and the sum of \$182.39 was raised. \$54.30 was paid to the Hall Committee. \$28.00 was spent on the buying of school equipment, namely, a globe, thermometer, waste-paper basket and school fair. The Institute purchased towels. \$2.00 was spent towards the school. The school was cleaned three times. Ice cream and candy were supplied at the public examinations held in the school. A bale of goods containing 28 articles was sent to Mt. Herbert Orphanage. This was made up of clothing, soap, towels, etc. Three quilts were sent. Four more are on hand for the same institution. These were all gifts from the members, no Institute funds being used for them.

Victoria.—Eleven meetings were held with an average attendance of 14 members and a total membership of 37. The receipts for the year were \$48.10, which was raised by the holding of entertainments and by donations. \$230.00 was given to the Hall Committee to be used in the completion of the interior of the Hall. A room in this Hall was made ready for the holding of Institute meetings. \$92.00 was donated to the Memorial Fund. The School was visited regularly by committees from the Institute. A new door-step was provided, the blinds repaired and dust-hans supplied. An Institute member was appointed as one of School Trustees. Organizing sewing was done at one meeting. A collection of useful articles for the P. E. I. Hospital was made. "A Clean-up Day" was appointed and much improvement made in the Village at that time.

South Lake.—Regular meetings were held. \$46.70 was raised during the year, partly by the holding of a social in the school. A map and roller were supplied to the school, also a book-shelf and supplies for the Hot School Lunch.

Barney.—Reorganized, May 12, 1921. Regular meetings were held, with a total membership for the year of 20. The painting of the interior of the Hall was completed at a cost of \$44.35. The school-rooms have been cleaned at the expense of the Institute. \$5.00 was spent on a wreath; blinds were bought for the school and new seats put in at a cost of \$31.45. Total receipts, \$185.57.

Spring Park.—This Institute was organized on July 1st, 1921, and has done excellent work. Nine regular meetings were held with an average attendance of 18, and a total membership of 20. Receipts for the year were \$249.71, raised by the holding of an ice cream social, cake sale and fancy work sale. Plans are being made for the re-seating of the primary room of the school.

Central Bedouie.—This Club was organized on July 8th, 1921. Much good work has been accomplished. Seven regular meetings have been held with an average attendance of 18 and a total membership of 28. Receipts for the year were \$68.35, raised by the serving of luncheon at hooked matches and the holding of an ice cream social. The interior of the two-roomed school was thoroughly cleaned and painted, the old blinds were mended, and several new ones bought. Prizes were given at the School Fair and a Christmas Tree supplied for the children. The

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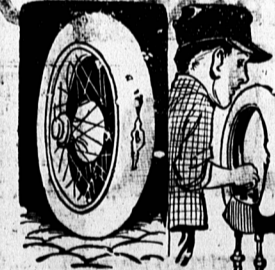
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school has been cleaned every month at the expense of the Institute.

Priest Pond.—This Institute was organized on August 24, 1921 and has done good work since that time. Seven regular meetings have been held with an average attendance of eighteen and a total membership of eighteen. Receipts, \$65.50, a large part of this being the proceeds of socials, Paint, oil and beaver-board were bought and used in renovating the school, the cost of the work done being also paid by the Institute. A kettle and towels were also bought and placed in the school. A creamer was bought to be used as a drinking fountain. During the winter a poor family was helped, each member supplying food and clothing. Every month a committee of four was appointed to clean the school. \$12.50 to Hospital Building Fund.

Rock Barra.—This Institute was organized in August 25, 1921. Regular meetings were held with an average attendance of twelve and a total membership of fourteen. A social and party were held. Total receipts being \$53.75. Two lamps were bought for the school.

Middleton.—This Institute was organized on September 6, 1921. Regular meetings were held with an average attendance of eighteen and a total membership of nineteen. Receipts for the year, \$87.87, made by social and by collections. Books and periodicals were ordered at the expense of the club. A pump is to be placed in the school. The school grounds are to be fenced in, each family in the district supplying one cedar post and the Institute buying the wire and needed. Trees are to be planted and the grounds improved in general.

Freeland, Lot 11.—This Club was organized on September 9, 1921. Five regular meetings have been held with an average attendance of eighteen and a total membership of nineteen. Receipts for the year, \$87.87, made by social and by collections. Books and periodicals were ordered at the expense of the club. A pump is to be placed in the school. The school grounds are to be fenced in, each family in the district supplying one cedar post and the Institute buying the wire and needed. Trees are to be planted and the grounds improved in general.

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organized on September 20, 1921. Since that time five regular meetings have been held with an average attendance of fifteen and a total membership of twenty-two. Total receipts, \$69.51. This was raised by a birthday party and a play. Four new blinds were supplied for the school. Eighteen bottles of jam and pickles were sent to the P. E. I. Hospital and two quilts were sent to the Mt. Herbert Orphanage.

Central Royalty.—This club was organized in October 28, 1921. Five regular meetings were held with an average attendance of ten and a total membership of fourteen. Receipts, \$64.11. This was raised by the holding of a birthday party. Prizes were given to the school children. A new school-house will be built in the near future and the Institute expects to help financially with this. A work also to have an Institute Room in connection with the school.

East Baltic.—Organization was formed on November 10, 1921. Four regular meetings were held with an average attendance of fourteen and a total membership of seventeen. Receipts, \$63.25. This was realized from the holding of a concert. The men of this district have been very

interested in the work of the club and have cooperated to a large extent in the work of school improvement. Beaver board was bought and used to refinish the interior of the school. A number of men contributed strapping, chair-rail and base-board for this work. A new picket fence is to be erected about the school grounds and the general appearance of the site improved.

St. Columbia Institute was organized November 11, 1921. Regular meetings have been held with an average attendance of twenty-seven and a total membership of thirty-two. Receipts, \$33.75. This

was raised by the holding of two parties.

Harrington.—Formerly Harrington and Winstoe were in one Institute but it was thought best to divide as many of the members found it difficult to attend if the meetings were distant from their homes. This organization meeting was held November 14, 1921. \$5.00 was given to the school and \$5.00 was set aside as a breakage fund on the Institute knitting machine. \$3.00 was paid for goods for Mt. Herbert Orphanage.
