Jap Envoy Sees A World Menace in China And Russia

LONDON, Aug. 6.—Baron Gonsuke Hayashi, resigning Japanese Ambassador to Great Britain, who is sailing for home today, uttered a warning regarding the Asiatic outlook in these words: "My opinion on the question regarding China and Russia is that they constitute the greatest present menace to the world's peace. The Soviet Government is endeavoring to create disturbances everywhere, including Japan."

Baron Hayashi was plain in his talk regarding the Pacific Ocean irritations, saying: "I do not really know what is meant by a Pacific menace. War is only possible in event of a quarrel between the United States and Japan. The United States is one of our best customers so it would be foolish for us to quarrel with her—there is no doubt but that the interest of the world powers are being increasingly centered in the Pacific. The Japanese menace, of political speeches is largely a fragment of political speeches in your democratic Dominions—a popular appeal is easily made by this means."
