REPAIRS MADE TO THE STANLEY

A. Lord, Agent of Marine Returns from Pictou

The Winter Steamer is Almost Completed—Will Reach Here Nov. 5—Description of the Work Done.

Saturday evening A. Lord, Marine Agent returned from Pictou where he has been inspecting the work on the Stanley. The carpenters have finished their work and were discharged and the painting is nearly completed. The Stanley expects to be ready for sea on Nov. 1st and will arrive here ready for winter service on Nov. 5th. Speaking of the repairs the Pictou Advocate says:

The Dominion Government steamer Stanley will soon be ready, and in thorough repair for the P. E. Island winter service. Built in 1883, the Stanley has been for fifteen years around this coast, doing perhaps more than her share of the work for the various departments, with only ordinary yearly repairs.

The experience of the steamer in winter in the Strait for over two months, was of such a nature that the Government decided that repairs contemplated for years should no longer be delayed, and hull, machinery and deck house have been put in first-class condition.

Repairs to the hull, which consisted of forcing out the dents in the side plating and reinforcing these weak spots with new angle-irons, were made by the Pictou Iron Foundry and Machine Co., who likewise built a new funnel, a ponderous piece, weighing nine tons. This was placed in position, as a whole, without the slightest hitch, by James Arbuckle, who had a sub-contract for the work from the Foundry Company.

That the latter concern carried out their contract in every detail to the satisfaction of the inspector, notwithstanding that there was an astonishing difference between their figure and that of the next lowest tenderer is sufficient proof that the practical men controlling the Foundry Company, know their business well. We are pleased to learn that they are well satisfied with their margin of profit on the job, and that business is good with them. They have about thirty employees and are kept so busy that they find it hard to make contemplated changes and improvements in buildings and plant.

Messrs Bruce Stewart and Company, of Charlottetown, did the machinist work in connection with the Stanley's engines, the first extensive repairs made upon them since the steamer was built.

The carpenter work was in charge of Simon Campbell, of Pictou, and consisted of a new roof with canvas covering for deck house, and a new wheel house with chart room. The wheel house is much larger than the old one, and has been built from the plan drawn by Thos. R. Ferguson, Chief Engineer of the Stanley. It has a circular front, and is being finished inside in native ash, trimmed with walnut, with white-wood panelling overhead and ash and walnut doors. This finish, along with black walnut fixtures such as chart tables lockers and desks, is being supplied by Messrs. D. Fullerton & Son, who make very neat work.

When the carpenters have finished in a day or two the painters will get to work and the Stanley will be in ship-shape order. Wm. Brennan, of Pictou, will do the painting.

A large amount of money has been circulated in Pictou as a result of the Stanley remaining here and it will be gratifying to Pictouians generally to know that the work upon the Stanley would not suffer in comparison with that to be obtained in any other port.
