SMELT SEASON FAIR—No definite figures for the smelt season just closed were available yet. J. Larabee, Supervisor of Fisheries, the Province said last night. However, it was believed from the verbal reports available that the catch would be equal to last year. Because of fluctuating markets it was harder to get an immediate estimate of the cash value, it was learned, but it was expected to approximate that of a year ago.

COLD WEEK END—Prince Edward Islanders had the coldest day this winter on Saturday. It was learned last night from Mr. Warren, weather observer at the Charlottetown Experimental Station, highest thermometer reading during the day was eight above, it was learned. It was down to three above during the night. The cold was backed by a wind from the north and north west which ranged in velocity from 20 to 25 miles-per-hour all during the day. Actual thermometer readings were lower earlier in the winter than on Saturday, it was pointed out, but the cold spell was accompanied by a calm weather and during the day the thermometer went much higher than Saturday's level. The weather was described as "freshish," for the cold was accompanied by a falling barometer usually an indication of rising temperatures.

143 which boarded the ship as passengers in the Netherlands, where they recently arrived after a period of internment in Germany. The men had served as seamen aboard German ships before the war, and presumably were released because of the expense of their maintenance.

FIRE IN APARTMENT
HALIFAX, March 3.—(CP)—Fire of unknown origin on flared in the basement of an apartment building, causing five injuries here today but with no deaths before any damage was done to the structure. Firemen carried one woman down a flight because of smoke-filled corridors.

Machine Gunned
Members of the crew, which totaled 150, said the German raider had machine-gunned the ship after raining bombs upon it. Fifty-one survivors, including 42 Indians and nine Europeans, were landed Saturday night at a south coast port by helicopter today, also brought ashore the bodies of three of the victims.

Leaflets. Flares
On the flight over Berlin R. A. F. planes reported they dropped leaflet and parachute flares, while bluish-white, red and yellow searchlights stabbed the skies. The pilots reported that ground batteries outide Berlin opened fire but that Nazi planes did not challenge the swift, scouts, all of which reached home safely.
