## Abbies Smother P. W. C. Welshmen 8 To 1 In Intermediate League

Jackie Kane's Abgweit pucksters smothered the Prince of Wales College Welshmen by a score of 8-1 at the Forum last night in an Island Intermediate Hockey League fixture. It was the Abbies seventh victory in eight starts this season and stretched their league leadership to 14 points, six ahead of second place Saint Dunstan's University and Victorias.

Joey LeClair was the leading scorer of the night with three goals and two assists, while Roach MacGregor and McInnis were next in line with a brace each. Art Perry notched up the other tally, while Ralph Sheppard collected four assists, and teamed up with LeClair on two of the smartest passing attacks of the night. Jackie Brown got the lone Welshman tally on assist from MacDonald and Downe.

### Only Three Penalties

The game was very cleanly played with only three penalties handed out, two to Welshmen and one to Abbies.

Playing to a scoreless first period, the Abbies got rolling in the second to outscore the Welshmen 4-1, and coming back even stronger in the final session, banged home four more without a reply from the Collegians to take an easy 8-1 victory.

It was anything but a good game to watch, with loose play and ragged passing predominating. It opened up with a slow, listless first period that saw both teams make a few good open breaks, but most of the time batted the puck around without doing any damage.

The game picked up a bit in the second frame when Perry opened the scoring at 2:32 when he winged in a long shot from about ten feet inside the blueline on Ralph Sheppard's passout.

About three minutes later McInnis broke clear on an intercepted pass inside the opposing blueline to skate in on goal for their second tally. The Welshmen got their only tally of the game at 10:57, when Gus Downe carried in from centre ice to pass over to Bennett MacDonald just over the blueline who took a shot that bounced off Hooper's pads, but Jackie Brown swooped in to bang in the rebound. Roach MacGregor came back less than a minute later, however, to pot one on a passing attack with LeClair and Sheppard. LeClair notched up the final goal of the frame in the last 30 seconds of play when he drove one in on a pass from Dalziel.

### Welshmen Miss Chances

Although the Welshmen started to force the attack a bit in the final session up to the halfway mark, they spoiled all their scoring chances with erratic passing and shooting, and the Abbies took over again from then on to notch up four goals before the frame ended. MacGregor got the first at 12:15 on a play with LeClair in front of the net, while Sheppard and LeClair teamed up with about the only smooth passing attacks of the night to rack up two more before the 14 minute mark was reached. LeClair got both on smart assists from Sheppard.

McInnis got the final tally, his second of the night, at 16:18, on a good play with Tom Clark in front of the net, the latter getting the assist.

The 1950 (Mid Century) Confederation Curling Bonspiel that has been going full swing all this week at the Charlottetown Curling Club, has been Provincial and visiting rinks, has been coming up with some outstanding curling during the past few days.

Although the competition has been kept all through the play to date and on a number of occasions has been so close to force matches into extra ends of play to decide a winner, one of the most exciting matches ever to be seen in local competition was witnessed there on Wednesday night.

The match was between two Charlottetown rinks skipped by J. S. MacDonald and Frank Acorn in second round play of Grand Championship competition. After battling hard and all through the match, both teams finished in a 7-7 deadlock at the conclusion of the first end. Forcing the issue into an extra end, it took skip MacDonald's last stone of the night to garner a slim one-point margin of victory. Laying one with Skip Acorn's last stone, which was well guarded, MacDonald wicked in to take out the Acorn stone and lay one himself for the final victory.

Despite plenty of keen competition from visiting teams, the Islanders as a whole have made the best showings to date and are progressing all along the line, while among the visiting teams, the W. Swan skipped rink from Brookline, Halifax, has been a highly creditable showing up to the end of Wednesday night's play.

The Prince of Wales College pucksters certainly didn't look much like the team that sent the King's University sockeys of Halifax down to a 5-2 defeat here last Friday night, when the Charlottetown Abbies took their measure last night to hand them out an 8-1 drubbing in a regular Island Intermediate Hockey League encounter.

Skating hard all the time and turning in very aggressive hockey in their game last Friday to turn in one of their best performances this season, the Collegians were almost the direct opposite last night and seemed listless and sloppy in their play to make about their worst showing this season.

It wasn't that the Abbies turned in such stiff opposition, because the game was far from well played in most of the time, but nevertheless the Abbies seemed to have little or no difficulty in overriding the Welshmen and outscoring them badly. The last time these two teams met the Abbies only beat them out by a two-goal margin.

It was not the fact that their regular goalie, Eddie Lund, was not in the nets either, as young Don Simmons, the Welshmen's relief goalie from the Junior ranks, turned in a very smart performance and certainly didn't let in any soft goals. Lund is out of action due to a blood clot in his leg from an injury, and is expected to have to go into hospital for a minor operation which will probably keep him off the roster for some time.

It was a bad time for the Welshmen to have an off night, because the defeat narrows down their chances greatly of making a playoff berth. With only two points and four games to play they trail Crystals by four points, S.D.U. and Vics by six and the leading Abbies by ten points.
