Hoover Indignant

(Canadian Press)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 30.—President Hoover struck back with a vigorous blow at the navy league tonight for its criticism of his naval policies.

Charging the organization with disseminating "untruths and distortions of fact" he said he would appoint a committee made up partially of league members, before which government agencies would demonstrate this to be the case.

After this is done, Mr. Hoover added, he will expect William H. Gardner, President of the League, "to make a public correction of his misstatements and an apology therefor."

Only last night the league issued a printed pamphlet saying the President had displayed an "abysmal ignorance" of how navies are maintained and of how they are used to accomplish their major mission.

Accompanying this statement with an expression of regret, the League said it was necessary to make it "if we are to have a real appreciation of the impelling motives back of President Hoover's efforts, at every turn, to restrict, to reduce, and to starve the United States navy—under the present plea of budget limitation, on which we may have further cause to comment."

New Canadian Linoleum Factories
