Re-enforcing an act regulating this matter. I do not believe that after one year there would be much trouble. When this would become law the fishermen could arrange the laths, around the lower side of the trap so that while handling it in the very small lobsters could escape. This need not be a part of the Act. The fishermen would soon make this change to save labor while fishing. The buyers of lobsters for the American market to be shipped alive have given me the information that in Richmond Bay the percentage of nine inches and over is 35 per cent. and under that size 65 per cent. while outside the Bay on the Gulf coast, the matter is reversed, and 60 per cent are nine inches and over, with the exception of Rustico and places near St. Peter's Bay and Savage Harbour where the average size is similar to that in Malpeque or Richmond Bay.

I may say that I appreciate the effort Mr. Edmarsh has made, and in fact, has always made since I have known him, and although we may differ on a few points yet, I hope that he will keep up the good work and ultimately the business will come back to be again profitable to both packer and fisherman.

There are only about two thirds as many packing plants in operation at present, as there were twelve years ago.

THE PEOPLE'S RAILWAY

Sir,—That the management of the railways of Canada should, to the extent that is possible, be kept out of the hands of the party politicians and their hangers-on is, I have no doubt, the desire of a vast majority of the people of Canada. The people—particularly those of the Maritime Provinces—saw and felt the ill-effects of "government management" on the Intercolonial Railway. They saw and felt, also the results that followed the independent management of the C. P. R. By an act of Parliament passed, I think, in the year 1919—it was consequently ordered that the management of the C. N. R. should be placed under the control of a railway company. The Federal Government, regarding the people—the owners of the railway—have the right, according to the Act, to appoint a President and Directors of the Company; and, otherwise, the Company manages the C. N. R.—or ought to manage it—just as independently of the politicians as the C. P. R. and other company-owned railways are managed.

On this principle Sir Henry Thornton was appointed President of the C. N. R. and Directors were appointed to advise with him. So Sir Henry and his fellow directors are responsible for the management of the C. N. R. in the interests of the people of Canada and the travelling public.

Though hampered, somewhat by Government interference, and the influences brought to bear by politicians who support the Government, the C. N. R., under its present management, greatly improved the railway conditions of Canada alike as to the accommodation afforded the public and the financial results.

Lately Sir Henry and his fellow directors have been threatened with competition in Halifax by the C. P. R. Naturally and properly the improvement steps towards the improvement of their position in Halifax. They are about to supply an improved railway station there and to erect a new first class hotel on the directly opposite side of the street.

The advantage of such an arrangement is seen in Ottawa and is patently to every reasonable and unprejudiced person. Certainly the public should not, in the circumstances, be hasty to condemn the C. N. R. management. They are acting as an enterprising and reasonable man, or company of men, threatened with opposition by strong competitors would act. They are adopting strong measures for the purpose of meeting the threatened competition; and these measures are in the interests of the port of Halifax and those of the country at large.

If, however, it should appear that they will have to unduly draw upon the Federal government for money with which to carry out their plans, the government can stop their supplies and compel them to fall back upon the company's own resources—the revenues derived from the railway business and the credit they have built up.

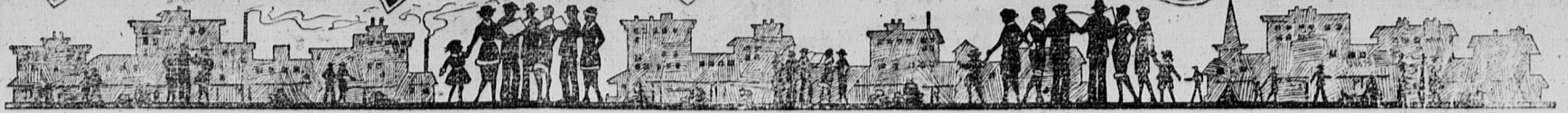

Crippled Boy Takes Long Trip

TRAVELS FOUR THOUSAND MILES TO HOSPITAL TO HAVE LEGS STRAIGHTENED.

LIVERPOOL, Eng., Dec. 12.—Sitting in the lounge of the Pacific liner Orcoma when she arrived at Liverpool recently was Sydney Wall a seven-year-old crippled boy who had made a 4,000 mile ocean trip from Bermuda to have his legs straightened. He was going to the Lord Mayor Treloar Crippled Hospital and college, Alton, Hampshire, for treatment.

Ever since birth Sydney has suffered from a deformity of the legs, which Bermuda doctors declared would prevent all possibility of his walking unless he underwent proper orthopaedic treatment. His father, a Bermuda war veteran, who served in France, applied for aid to the War Veterans' Association and

through their agency and the generosity of a patron of the Bermuda Association it was made possible to send the boy to the Treloar home. During the voyage Sydney was in the charge jointly of a Mr. Smith of Hamilton, Bermuda and the ship's nurse.

Montreal Club Makes Plans For \$700,000 Stadium

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—Walter Hagen, national professional golf champion, and John Ganzel, former first baseman of the Cincinnati Reds, today were granted an additional week in which to raise enough funds to complete their purchase of the Rochester International League Club. Montreal, which replaces Jersey City, was formally welcomed into the league. President Toole announced that the Montreal club had

completed its organization and had plans for a \$700,000 stadium. Appointment of a schedule committee was left in the president's hands. Toole said the committee would be named some time next week and would begin its work immediately.
