LONDON, July 31.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Mail says the order for the withdrawal of the Russian troops from Manchuria has been rescinded as that country is overrun with Chinese robber bands. Quantities of Russian goods in transit have been looted.

Besides his father and mother, two brothers, Edward and Roy; and three sisters, Mrs. R. H. Campbell, Summerside, Mrs. Cyrus Moore, Union Road, and Miss Eva at home, are left to mourn the loss of a dear son and brother.
