Senators Nervous, Drop Chance For Top Place

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—The ambitious Washington Senators became nervous today when they had an opportunity to narrow the gap separating them from the American League's first place and as a result dropped a 4-1 decision to New York Yankees.

The Senators made four errors, one of which was a wild throw over first base by starting pitcher Ewald Pyle to let in two runs in the third inning.

Each team made six hits, but Spurgeon "Spud" Chandler, the Yankee ace, kept out of trouble as he went about making his seventh success against one defeat.

He allowed no hits for the first five innings and for the first four permitted no Washington player to reach first base.

By the time the Senators got around to scoring their lone run in the eighth, on a single, a walk, a double play and a single by Stan Spence, the Yankees had the game won.

The victory increased New York's first-place margin to three games over the Senators.

ST. LOUIS, June 14 (AP)—The Cooper brothers, Morton and Walker, put on a show today that clinched a 3-3 National League victory for the Cardinals over Cincinnati. In addition, Harry Walker hit safely in his 21st consecutive game.

The contest had developed into a 100-yard tuck pitching duel between Mort and Roy Starr until the fatal sixth inning.

Chuck Klein, first man up, got hold of one that carried him to first. Walker went down on a pop up but Debs Garms doubled Klein

to third. Starr Mustal was intentionally walked. Walker Cooper crossed up Cincinnati's strategy by ripping a triple, scoring three runs.

The husky catcher was run down between third and home a few moments later when Steve Mesner, but the Cards gained another run on a single and a fumble, Kurrowski crossing the plate.

Fish and Game News

At the last meeting of the Fish & Game Protective Association the Game Bird Committee brought in a resolution to ask the Federal Dept. of National Resources to improve the ponds and inlets of the National Parks so as to encourage the breeding of waterfowl.

I believe that unless some steps like this are taken, that our next generation are not going to enjoy the shooting privileges that we in the present generation have.

Now what can we do for the generation that is to come. I know that every true sportsman who has a son long for the day when he can take his boy along with him in the hunting season to his favorite hunting spot or blind and watch him beat about his first duck or goose. But what are you men doing to help this cause along, otherwise than sitting back in the favorite easy chair with your shot gun in your lap telling this boy of yours how many ducks or geese you shot in your day and probably how you exceeded the bag limits, how our present game laws are all rotten and so forth. There is a time and place for everything, and the place for the sportsman as mentioned above is to join the Fish and Game Protective Association. Don't sit back in the favorite easy chair and expect some one else to do the work and then run this down, join now so you can express your opinion where it can be used to advantage.

Just to show what is being done by one great body of sportsmen, to preserve the hunting for the future, I would like to reprint a clipping taken from the Calgary Herald of May 29, 1943.

ALLOCATE LARGE SUM FOR DUCKS UNLIMITED

The sum of \$135,000 in U. S. funds has been allocated for the 1943 program of Ducks Unlimited, Canadian, by Ducks Unlimited, Inc. It was announced Friday afternoon at the closing session of the annual meeting of the Canadian organization held in the Palace Hotel, O. Leigh Spencer, retiring president, was in the chair.

It was the largest annual project ever made and will bring to \$842,000 the amount of money to be spent in Canada to develop duck breeding grounds and conserve ducks.

One of the biggest projects in the year's development program will be undertaken in the South from his district south of Bassano, which is being financed by a group of Louisiana sportsmen.

UTILIZE WASTE WATER

In this scheme the waste water of the Eastern Irrigation District will be utilized to form 40 small lakes within 40 miles estimated will grow 1,000 ducks a year.

In addition to this project a considerable amount of preliminary survey work will be done this year to prepare for post-war development of Ducks Unlimited projects on a big scale.

The United States sportsmen present at the meeting were very enthusiastic over the work being carried on in Canada so that ducks would be available for the sportsmen serving with the armed forces of their country and Canada.

It was stated that Ducks Unlimited was firmly established and was not planning a 10-year development program.

Sorry to say we down in Eastern Canada will not be able to enjoy any of this money being done by Ducks Unlimited as the birds will be on the Mississippi Flyway and not the Atlantic Flyway.

Being so close I would like to quote the Hon. J. C. Creed and if followed by all sportsmen it may help to solve a lot of our problems.

He who hunts and kills not all birds but serves with the birds will be neither sport nor gentleman.

Reclining in a Boston hospital, where he is recovering from a broken leg suffered just at the start of the National League season, the now manager of the Boston Braves seems to find time hanging heavy on his hands, so it is not surprising that he should be doing such things, if only for the sake of stirring up an argument. He's that kind of a guy.

At any rate, here is how Stengel rates his four top outfield combinations:

1. Babe Ruth, Bob Meusel and Earl Combs of the Yankees.
2. Tris Speaker, Duffy Lewis and Harry Hooper of the Red Sox.
3. Joe DiMaggio, Tommy Henrich and Charles Keller of the Yankees.
4. Ty Cobb, Wahoo Sam Crawford and Bob Veach of the Tigers.

If it is an argument Casey was looking for when he made his South coast, he will probably get one here. In both starts the Pirates who are bound to resent the fact that he didn't name even a single fly-chasing threesome to the circuit to which he owes allegiance.

But since that's none of our business, let's just discuss the merits of the four outfielders he has named.

The top Yankees trio of Ruth, Meusel and Combs played as a unit for five years, 1923 through 1928, and played well over 300 in hitting each season, with Ruth as the peak year. That was the homerun mark at 60 and the straight in the world series. The Ruth and Combs hit 349 at bat, and Meusel hit 356 at bat. Ruth, they were all long-distance hitters, likely to hit one into the stands at any moment. They were also a crack team, the Yankees, a threesome who could cover ground and made few mistakes in judgment.

The Red Sox group rightly belongs right on the heels of the Yankees. They were together from 1910 through 1915, and in Speaker, possessed the art and greatest batters in the league and a defensive hawk who is still regarded as the peer of all center fielders. Lewis was a good fielder and hitter while Hooper held the name of the finest throwing arms in the Red Sox was defensive in the field. Speaker's best year with him hit 389 but in 1912 when he was lops in 1911 at 315. Speaker hit 377, Hooper 311 and Lewis 307.

The DiMaggio, Keller, Henrich outfit is certainly the best to be played together from 1939 through 1942 and the average of best year with combined was their league at bat with 330. DiMaggio that season led the league at bat with 381. While Henrich's average was never high he hit many homers. DiMaggio and Keller were always among the league-leaders in homers and runs batted in. All had good throwing arms. And there were those who even regarded DiMaggio as Speaker's peer as a centre fielder.

The Detroit entry had its best combined average of 327 in 1915 when Cobb hit 313 and Crawford 296. Cobb was undoubtedly baseball's all-around star—tops at bat and on the bases and a good fielder and thrower.

Winning the tight games was a big factor in St. Louis Cardinals' triumph in the National League last year, as they won 14 games by one run in their 160-streel drive and lost only one by the same margin.

In this year's campaign they have figured in 24 games in which the winners had a margin of but a single run and they have been best in 14 of them. Brooklyn Dodgers, on the other hand have been defeated in 18 games which have been decided by the small margin, and have lost 11 of them.

Brooks' mouth popped open in pain. He started to put up his hands

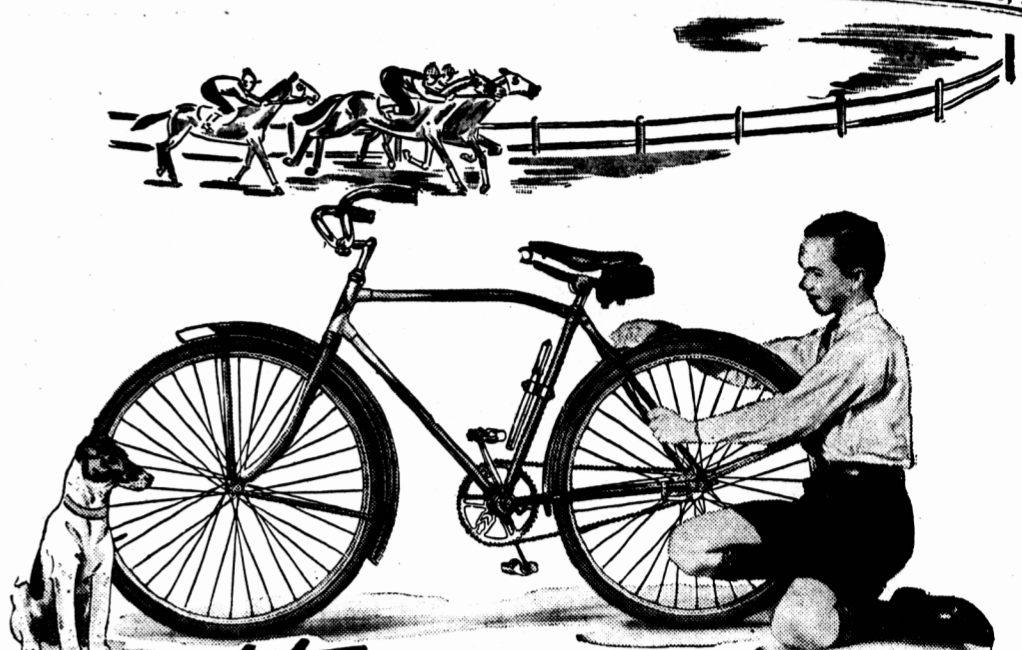

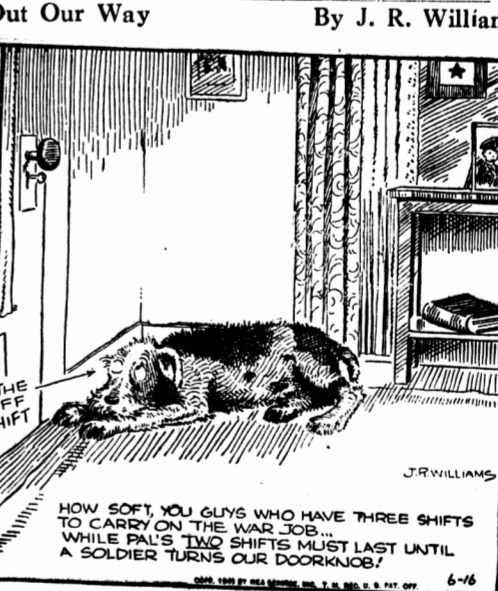

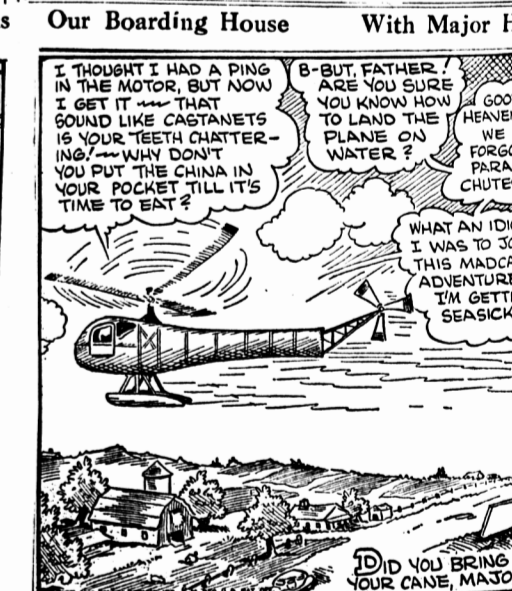
