IN MEMORIAM

ENOCH ACKLAND The death took place at Hampshire, P. E. I., Aug. 26th, 1926, of Enoch Ackland one of the oldest and most respected citizens of the community. He had reached the advanced age of 89, and had enjoyed comparatively good health until fifteen months before his death, at which time he took a paralytic stroke.

Mr. Ackland was born in Devon, England, in 1837, and came to P. E. I. with his parents, Richard and Grace Ackland, when two years of age. Here he shared with them the task of clearing the wilderness, and bringing the fertile soil to that state of cultivation that makes of his adopted province the "Garden of the Gulf."

He married Mary Cummings who predeceased him eight years ago, and to this union were born five children—Stephen who succeeds him on the homestead, Rev. L. E. Ackland, Sydney, N. S., Mrs. Hammond Newson, Westport, P. E. I., Mrs. Samuel Goode, Royalty, P. E. I. He was a man of sterling Christian character, having given his heart to God at the age of 12 years. He was a great reader of the Bible and taught his children—honesty in word and deed; industry; to work hard and enjoy it; reverence and confidence in the Word of God. They rise up to call him blessed and his passing away marks another departure in that long list of stalwart, God-fearing men and women who have given to us our churches and what is worth while in our present day civilization.

The funeral services were largely attended, a large cortege following the remains to their last resting place in Ever Wilshire, to be laid by those of his precious life companion, and to await the call of the Christ he loved so well. Evangelist J. W. Hayter conducted the services, assisted by Mr. V. V. Delong.

MRS. JOSEPH I. STEWART A shadow of gloom was cast over a large circle when it was learned that Mrs. Joseph I. Stewart of Bay View had passed to her Eternal Home. Although she had been in failing health for some time, hope was held out for her recovery, and she entered the Prince County Hospital for treatment, but despite the best of care and skill her gentle spirit went to Him who gave it.

Martha, as she was familiarly known, was a favorite with all, her cheerful smile, her bright and happy manner won for her a host of friends. Her hospitable home was a centre where many gathered and all were made welcome. She took an interest in all activities of community life and will be greatly missed by those who knew her. She leaves to mourn their great loss her husband and son Lorne and one daughter Muriel; also her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William D. McCoubrey, of New Glasgow, one brother, Nelson, of Cavendish, and three sisters, Mrs. J. W. Hestline of Windsor, Ont., Mrs. Robert Sellar and Mrs. Robert L. Stevenson, both of Wheatley River. One brother, Theophilus, made the supreme sacrifice in the Great War, and two sisters, Lucy and Aurline predeceased her.

The funeral services, which were attended by relatives and friends from far and near, were conducted by the Rev. J. S. Bonnell of St. John's and a former pastor of Cavendish Congregation, of which she was a member. Rev. W. J. McLeod, a cousin of the deceased, assisted. Mr. Bonnell gave a helpful and impressive address, emphasizing the responsive love of the Father, who is waiting to receive us when we relinquish our hold upon the things of temporal existence and drop into His all-embracing arms.

Interment was at Cavendish Cemetery and at the close of Mr. Bonnell's service the members of the Eastern Star performed the last rites of their order for a departed sister. The pall bearers were B. L. McEwen, James O. Simpson, R. J. Anderson, Hammond McKenzie, A. C. McNeill and F. W. Clarke.

MR. ALBERT LEARD. There passed peacefully away at his home in New Glasgow, on the morning of Saturday, Aug. 28, Mr. Albert Leard, at the age of eighty-four. He was the last surviving member of his family, was born in Rev. J. M. Murchison, the latter New Glasgow and spent his long life here. Although of a quiet and retiring nature, Mr. Leard was a good friend and neighbor, and will be missed both in the home and in the community.

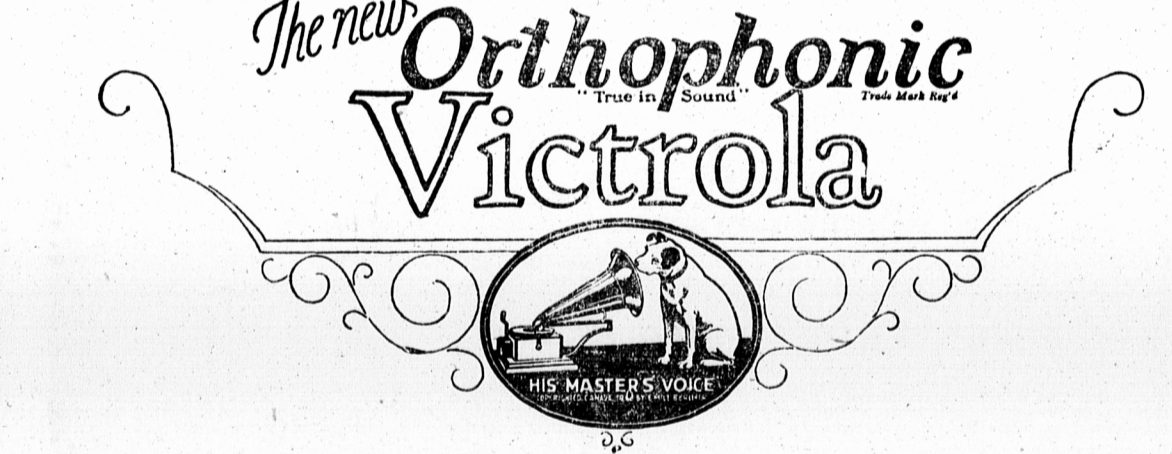
