



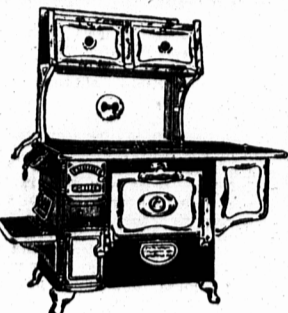

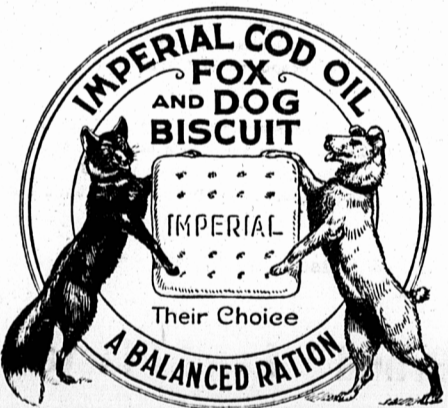

At 10 a.m. mails close for Central Bedeque and St. Leonors. At 2.30 p.m. mails close for the mainland, Kensington, Free town, Kingsora, Emerald and point east of Emerald. At 5.45 p.m. all points west. On Tuesday, the train day and Saturday mail closes at 11.30 a.m. for Miscouche, Wellington, Richmond, Port Hill, Tyne Valley, Ellerslie, Coleman, O'Leary, Bloomfield, St. Louis, Alberton and Summerside. Mails arrive at the Summerside Post Office at 6.40 a.m. from all points west; at 8.30 a.m. from St. Leonors and Central Bedeque; at 9.35 a.m. from east; at 6.15 p.m. from Madaland and east at 10.25 p.m. from the mainland.

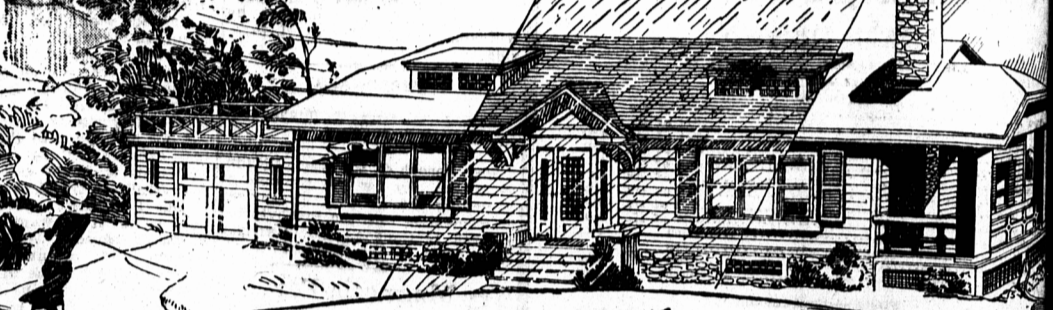
