SPANISH EGGS

One onion, 1 pound of ripe tomatoes, 2 to 4 eggs, 2 tablespoons grated cheese, 2 tablespoons butter, salt and pepper. Method: Peel and slice the tomatoes, dipping them first in boiling water that the skin may be easily removed. Fry the onion and tomatoes slowly in the butter in a frying pan until they go to a mash. Put in the eggs and poach them in the cooked tomatoes. Season with salt and pepper, and sprinkle with cheese. Brown very lightly in oven, or under broiler.

Garden Furniture

"I suppose it will," said Poppy. "And you must remember that I've been out of college two years long—more than you have. You can't be too particular at first about having a

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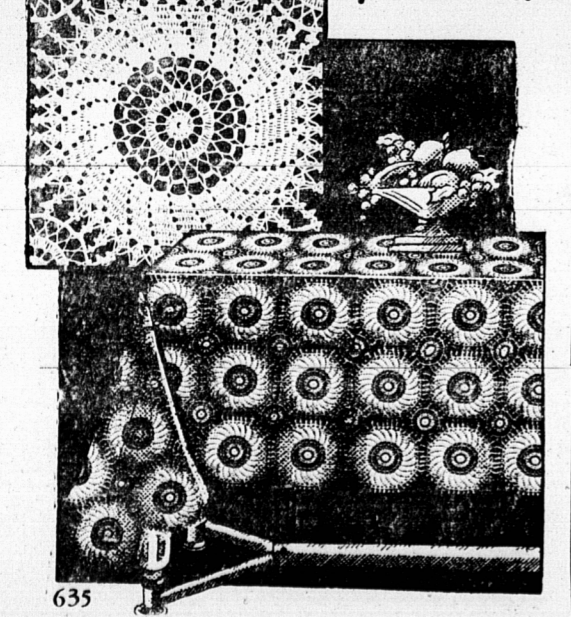
