Double Feature With Charlie Chaplin At The Prince Edward

After an absence of almost five years, the one and only Charlie Chaplin returned to the screen of the Prince Edward Theatre last night in his long-awaited comedy, "Modern Times." The occasion proved well worth waiting for. Time has not altered his genius. Charlie Chaplin is still the world's funniest comedian. One of the highlights of the film is the scene in which Charlie does an unusual routine in pantomime in a big steel factory, lightning bolts in a waterfront cafe to the tune of "Tina." In this scene, which is the only one in the film which was shot directly in sound, Charlie adapts his own "musical language" to films in a highly original and interesting way and the result is one of the funniest sequences ever flashed on a screen. In addition to writing, directing,

producing and starring in "Modern Times," Chaplin also wrote the music and cut the film.

The size of single yarn is: medium, doubled yarn: fine, medium, coarse and hooking. Put shipper's and owner's name on all parcels, address and instructions inside.
