The "Fairview" made the crossing to the mainland Friday and is expected to return, if weather conditions are favorable, on Wednesday.

SILVER SIVERS UP 5% TO \$70 — Silver foxes continued to meet with a comparatively good demand at the sale held Friday by Lampson, Fraser & Co. Prices obtained were about on the basis of the opening of the sale on Tuesday. Three-quarter silvers sold up to a top of \$70 an advance of 5 per cent over the previous sale. Trimmings manufacturers were again the most active bidders. Attendance of buyers was largest at the morning session, with trade estimates indicating that a substantial percentage of the offering changed hands. — New York Times.

FERRY TO LEAVE FOR BORDEN — The S. S. Charlottetown, ice breaking ferry on the T. orientine, N. E. and Borden, this province, service across Northumberland Strait is expected to leave dry dock at Saint John, N. B., on return to Borden today. The ship has been away for the past month undergoing annual overhauling. Meanwhile the service is being carried on by the older board S. S. Prince Edward Island. It had been expected earlier that the Charlottetown would be ready to leave Saint John yesterday, but final details caused delay. If present plans materialize, the boat will arrive in Borden Wednesday.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES

TRINITY UNITED CHURCH
At the morning service, the preacher was the Rev. W. M. Ryan, D. D., a former pastor of this church, who was welcomed to the pulpit by the Pastor, Rev. Hugh Miller, Dr. Ryan, took as his text, John, 8:32, "Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free."

All truth, said the preacher, finds its supreme embodiment in Jesus Christ. He is Himself "the truth." Therefore He not only said "the truth shall make you free," but immediately added "the Son shall make you free." No man is ever saved by his creed, however excellent. The "faith of our fathers" will not save us. It is a man's own faith, his own personal trust in and love for Jesus Christ, that alone brings freedom and thus prepares for service.

There are three kinds of bondage from which men are freed by the person and the word of Jesus. First, the bondage of superstition, secondly, the bondage of an unworthy social order, and thirdly the bondage of sin and death.

The points were elaborated by the preacher, who declared that Jesus, by His teaching of the Fatherhood of God, the brotherhood of man, and the certainty of a full life, He opened the great Liberator of the thought and life of all mankind. Impracticable as it may seem, to listen to and obey Him, is the only sure way to peace and freedom for the individual or the nation.

He says to men today precisely what He said to these people long years ago—"Ye shall know the truth, and when you know the truth, when you see the relation of truth to conduct, and realize truth in action, the truth shall make you free."

In the absence of Rev. Mr. McKenzie, who is attending the Maritime Conference at Sackville, Rev. Butler conducted the evening service and preached from Galatians 2:1, dealing particularly with the work and plans of the conference.

The music for the day consisted of an anthem "Just As I Am," E. R. Bowles, sung at the morning service and at the evening service Mr. E. White, of Sydney, C. B., rendered very pleasingly "Just For Today" by E. L. Ashford.

ST. JAMES CHURCH
The Minister, the Rev. R. Moorehead Legate D.D., conducted both services at St. James Presbyterian Church yesterday. Dr. Legate at the morning service spoke from the text Philippians 2:5. "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus." He stressed the necessity for getting at the mind of Jesus Christ and sharing our dispositions after His in living the Christian life. Three of Christ's prominent characteristics in this regard, the Minister said, were humble-mindedness, hopeful-mindedness and heavenly-mindedness.

At the evening service Dr. Legate delivered a sermon from 1st Peter 3:18-22. "O Lord, I am oppressed; undertake for me." He referred to God as the Great Comforter in time of trouble.

Miss Margaret Martin for her interest and work in the Good Will Mission Band was made a life member provided by Mrs. W. L. Prowse. Dr. Legate made the presentation during the meeting of the Sunday School.

Music at the morning service consisted of the organ and choir. "I waited for the Lord," Mendelssohn, Mrs. Raymond, Mrs. H. Henderson, Mrs. J. A. Lawson, Mrs. N. D. McLean, Messrs. Arthur Bruce and Raouf Messra. At the evening service Mrs. G. E. P. acting organist, played as an offertory selection "Ave Maria," Schubert.

THE BAPTIST CHURCH
The morning service was a united gathering of the church and the Church School, marking the beginning of the summer program. Mr. M. M. Bethune, Superintendent, assisted, reading the morning lessons. The Rev. H. I. Denton, B. Th., B. D., delivered a sermon at the morning service on "The Child in the Midst," based on the words of Jesus in Matthew 18:2. Briefly he outlined some of the features of progress during the past year, the growth of the School to its highest record of attendance, the establishment of a permanent young people's camp and picnic ground at Maizefield, as a beginning, buildings and equipment to the value of \$5000 had been established there. Accommodation for Church School and Junior activities had been doubled, the construction of a new basement assembly room. A large number of young people had entered the membership of the Church by baptism at Easter. Men's and Women's groups were organized. Christian Education Committee under the leadership of Mr. J. W. Boulter, Mrs. D. N. Bell, Mr. M. R. Bethune. The Young People's League and Mr. S. D. Irvine, Associate Superintendent had greatly stimulated Church attendance among the young. Mr. Boulter and Mr. Irvine presented certificates of attendance to a large number of boys and girls, many of whom over a period of 8 months had made a record of 100 per cent attendance.

The Junior Choir sang "The Carol of Beauty."

At the evening service the Rev. H. I. Denton delivered a notably eloquent sermon on "When the Weaker Sex Was Stronger" based on the story of Deborah and Barak. The violin offertory by Miss Campbell was "Trials of a Prayer." The evening anthem was Blachford's "Peacefully Round Us." Miss Calbeck used as organ preludes "Chorale of St. Columba" and Stanford's "Intermezzo on an Irish Air."
