NIXON RACES FOR WAR CONTRACTS

New York, Feb. 4. Lewis Nixon, former president of the United Shipbuilding Company, has started in a race for Russia with Charles M. Schwab, who owns the Bethlehem Steel plant, once part of the Shipbuilding Company. The prize in this race is said to be contracts for building battleships to replace the Russian ships destroyed by the Japanese at Port Arthur. It is said \$100,000,000 is to be spent by Russia.

A representative of Mr. Nixon said today that he was already in Europe, but had not yet reached Russia. Mr. Schwab, it is understood, will sail within a fortnight for Russia, where he hopes to close negotiations with the Russian Ministry for the coveted contracts.

Since the collapse of the United States Shipbuilding Company Mr. Nixon has obtained another shipyard of his own at Perth Amboy, N. J., formerly known as Ramsay's yard, and here he has been building torpedo boats which are understood to have been going to Russia. The yard is not big enough, however, for the construction of battleships or great war vessels.

Mr. Nixon's representative said today that he understood the Nixon idea was not to build Russia's new vessels here, but to utilize American shipbuilding knowledge in the construction of the vessels at Russian yards.

Mr. Schwab is reported to have lately and several conferences with Count Cassini, the Russian ambassador to this country, about the new warships. His Bethlehem company is able to turn out a battleship complete, including the armour.

WONDERFUL PEAR TREE

At Walderfield, Germany, formerly grew a wonderful pear tree. When things were prosperous it blossomed and bore fruit, and when they declined its leaves became blanched and no fruit was formed. In 1831, when Napoleon forced the feeble Francis II. to surrender his title of German Emperor and to content himself with that of Francis I. of Austria, this tree yielded neither leaves nor fruit.

In 1818, when German unity seemed to be a possibility, it blossomed once more, but only to languish again when the dream melted away. In 1870 it celebrated the achievements of the army by yielding a most abundant crop.

While the Russian army was encamped before Constantinople, after the signing of the treaty of San Stefano, and before the assembling of the Berlin Congress, alarm was manifested by the solitary at a remarkable instance of the phenomenon known as the fata morgana.

One day, in the direction of the Black Sea, there appeared in the sky the counterfeit of fortifications which an officer who knew the place pronounced to be those of Sevastopol. As the fortress was about three hundred and eighty miles distant, it was an extraordinary case of refraction. The soldiers were confirmed in their view that it was an unlucky portent, for even afterward the British fleet entered the Dardanelles, and all its aid vanished like the mirage of a delusion. CZAR PARDONS RIOTERS

St. PETERSBURG, Feb. 5.—"Good day, my children!" It was thus that Emperor Nicholas II. addressed the deputation of workmen who, after witnessing the streets of St. Petersburg run red with their comrades' blood, met the czar in audience at Tsarko-Selo.

Theoretical in the extreme was the meeting. The workmen, selected from 32 of the largest manufacturing plants in the city, and accompanied by Governor-General Treppoff and Finance Minister Kokovsov, were ushered into one of the splendid reception rooms of the palace.

The emperor entered, attended by Grand Duke Michaelovich, General Hesse and other distinguished members of the czar's official family. "Good day, my children," said the czar. "We wish your majesty good health, and I have summoned you in order that you may hear my words from myself and communicate them to your companions.

"The recent lamentable events, with which I have been obliged to deal, have occurred because you allowed yourselves to be led astray by traitors and enemies to our country. When they induced you to address a petition to me on your needs they desired to see you revolt against me and my government.

"I am convinced of the honesty of the workmen and their devotion to myself, and I pardon their transgression. Return to your work with your comrades and carry out the tasks allotted to you. May God assist you."

The workmen were then dismissed with the command to convey the czar's message to their fellows. They were given dinner in a deserted schoolhouse adjoining the palace, and the czar's health was drunk with gusto.

The emperor has issued a manifesto expressing the sympathy of the emperor, the empress and the dowager empress for the families of those killed during the riots. Their necessities have subscribed \$25,000 for the sufferers.
