

THE FORESTER'S TEMPLE.

When it was announced, some six years ago, that the Independent Order of Foresters had purchased the property at the corner of Richmond and Bay streets and intended erecting thereon a large building, which, besides providing headquarters for the society, would also furnish office accommodation for professional and business men. Many people shook their heads ominously, and even openly predicted failure for the enterprise. The location was declared unsuitable and out of the way, and the undertaking, it was freely said, could not be made to pay as an investment. Dr. Oronhyatekha had his eyes fixed upon the future and its possibilities, and was not to be turned from his purpose by prophecies of disaster. He ignored the prophets; and went on with the work. He built the magnificent temple that now stands where six years ago stood ramshackle tenements, and Toronto is to-day as a result of his persistence and enterprise, able to point to the I. O. F. headquarters as among the conspicuous attractions of the city. He has done more; he has filled the Temple with tenants, until now there is not a vacant office in it. All are rented, and well rented, and the demand for lodge accommodation was so great that it be-

came necessary to increase the number of lodge rooms by dividing one of them into two. In addition the large assembly has become the most popular in the city for concerts at homes and assemblies and has dates booked ahead for several weeks. The Temple, like the great order it stands for, is a success, and Dr. Oronhyatekha may well feel proud of it.—Toronto Globe.

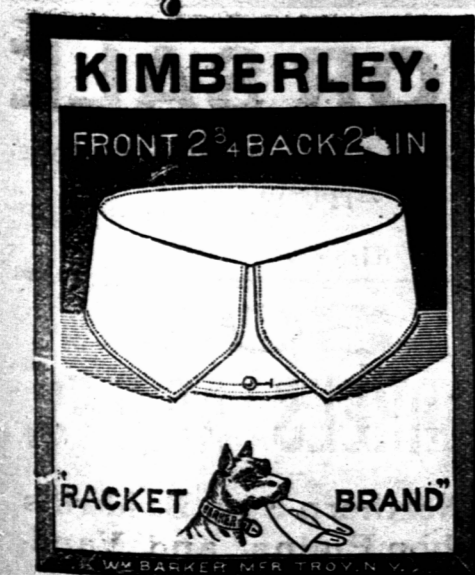

WILL RETURN TO INDIA.

LONDON, March 1.—A notable figure of Queen Victoria's court is about to leave England for Bombay. This is Mohammed Ishmail Abdullah one of the two stalwart attendants of the late Queen, who has determined to return to India.

These two Indians were for years in constant attendance on Queen Victoria at home and abroad. At state social functions they acted in a similar capacity to the cup-bearers of the kings of the olden times. They seldom left the royal presence standing statue like behind the Queen's chair. For years the Queen had not been seen in public unless attended by them. On a railway, or royal yacht, or in the palace garden, or when driving, they were always close at hand.

The Queen used to converse with them in Hindustani, in which she was greatly interested.

GEN. BULLER TURNED DOWN.

LONDON, March 1.—There is considerable comment in military circles on account of a communication from the war office which appears in army orders at Aldershot to-day, discountenancing General Buller's views on the training of artillery, announced by him February 7th at Aldershot, and which are to the effect that too much drill was introduced into this arm while on the battlefield the action of batteries being paralyzed, in many cases by awaiting the orders of the brigade or division commander, many favorable opportunities would be missed. The criticisms therein were intended for the guidance of General Buller's command.

CURE FOR CONSUMPTION.

CLEVELAND, March 1.—It is stated that a company will be organized here within a few days composed of Cleveland and Eastern capitalists at \$1,000,000 to erect a system of sanitariums in large cities throughout the country for the cure of consumption by electricity, it is alleged that a positive cure for the disease has been found. Colonel William S. Rogers of the Brush Electric Company is one of promoters of the company. He said: "The company is financing a new invention. An absolute cure for consumption has been found. Electricity will play a most prominent part in the cure we are advancing and we anticipate ends we aim at to be attained. Medicine plays no part whatever." A site has been chosen and the first sanitarium will be built in this city at cost of \$18,000.

FIGHTING WITH LOCOMOTIVES.

LONDON, March 1.—A Despatch from Standerton, Transvaal states that on February 14th a pilot train, with the engine behind was brought to a standstill by the blowing up of a culvert midway between Vaal and Greylingstad and was fired at by concealed Boers. An armored train which was following, came into action, but its pom-pom jammed and the train had to put back for some distance to adjust the gun.

The enemy, who numbered 300, uncoupled the engine of the pilot train and sent it at full speed back towards the armored train. The latter however promptly backed, and the engine, mounting an incline was brought to a standstill without sustaining material injury. We had no casualties. Two Boers were seen to fall from the fire of the armored train, and shells from Greylingstad burst in their midst, knocking a few men over.

NEARLY \$500,000,000.

LONDON, February 23.—The third supplementary estimate of £3,000,000 for the expenses of the war was issued to-day. Transport and the purchase of remounts swallow up £2,000,000 and provisions and forage cost £1,000,000. This brings the total voted for the financial year up to £95,309,153.
