"Victoria The Great" opened last night at the Capitol Theatre, Summerside and held the packed house spell-bound all through. This picture with its historic setting showed the tender side of Queen Victoria's character. CAPT. WALTERS DEMANDS NEW RACE COURSE

BOSTON, Oct. 5—(CP)—Capt. Angus Walters of the Nova Scotia Schooner Bluenose, leader of the International Fishermen's Racing Trophy, came to Boston from Gloucester, Mass., today in fine fettle over what he calls a "merry-go-round" course for the Fishermen's race and the committee's failure to live up to the deed-of-gift rules.

Leaving behind his crew, who spent the day scraping and painting the Bluenose on the Marine Railway at Gloucester, Capt. Walters met members of the director's committee at the Chamber of Commerce Building in a secret session tonight.

—The Lunenburg Skipper seemed considerably upset when he was seen before the meeting. "If they want an exhibition race, I'll give it to them," he said, "but I won't race for the cup under these regulations."

He referred to a list of special instructions and layout of the course as printed for the first time today in a folder released by the race committee.

Under the heading "special instructions" is rule no. 1: "No restrictions as to sails, crews or ballast."

Capt. Walters protests that under the deed-of-gift rules and regulations for the International Trophy, the crews are limited (32 men) and the ballast and area of sail are restricted according to the waterline length of the vessels.

He also objects to racing twice around the triangular course which is planned for six miles on each leg, calling the course a "merry-go-round."

Previous listings of race committee members omitted the two Nova Scotians and reliable sources here claim they are 11th hour additions.

Capt. Walters could make no headway with the directors at the meeting inasmuch as any protest would have to be made with the race committee itself and he will not meet them until tomorrow.

Certain members of the Board of directors before the meeting expressed the belief the deed-of-gift rules should be lived up to and expected the differences would be ironed out to Capt. Walters' satisfaction.

A map of this course was released in the same folder with the set of instructions and according to Capt. Walters is "not in keeping with the rules and regulations" of the International Trophy Committee.
