WONDERFUL MILK RECORD—
With 30 days still to go to com-
plete a year's record, Countess Ab-
bekeff Hienke, owned by the Bun-
bury Farm, near Charlottetown,
has already passed the Canadian
record for milk and butter fat. She
is still milking 75 pounds daily and
has milked as high as 112 pounds.
The Countess has an appetite in
keeping with record of perform-
ance. Mr. Jones her owner informs
the Guardian her meal diet for the
past two years exceeded eight
tons, and her field roots diet ex-
ceeded 20 tons. Her production of
milk in these two years exceeded
27 tons conservatively valued at
\$800.

P. W. C. DEBATE—The Prince of
Wales Debating Society held a de-
bate on Tuesday, April 14th. The
subject was, "Resolved, that there
should be a tax on all unmarried
people over 35 years of age. The
speakers on the pro, side Francis
Read and Benoit Martin brought
forth good arguments in favour of
such a tax. They said that unmar-
ried people should help to pay the
expenses of Education and other
public benefits and they claimed
that the man with a family paid
more indirect taxes on everyday
necessities than did the unmarried
man and that taxes on everyday
necessities would be more properly
imposed as a special tax on unmar-
ried people. The speakers
on the con side, Robert
Donald and Antouin Bernard
claimed that such a tax would be
unfair, that unmarried people al-
ready have their just portion of
taxation and that such a tax would
tend to degrade the canonicity of
marriage. The vote resulted in a
victory for the pro side. The critic,
Mr. R. Wright expressed himself as
pleased with the debate. The
Honorary President in a brief
address, stressed the great need of
a more favorable public sentiment
towards taxation.

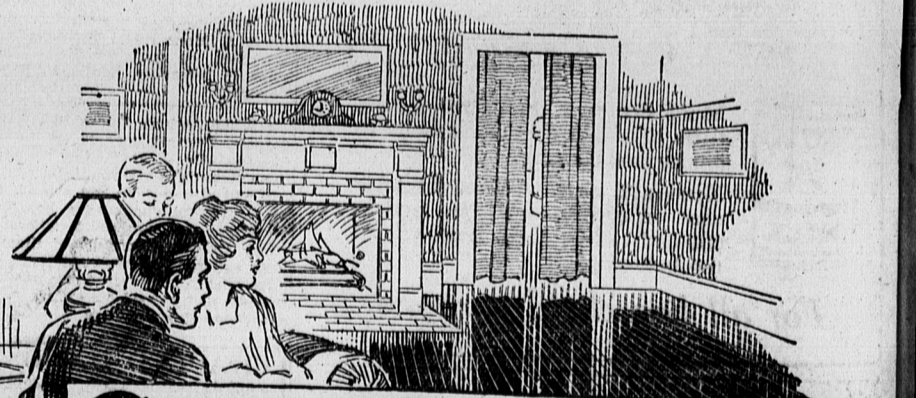
