CHINESE REMAINS BEING TAKEN BACK TO CHINA—James Ross, undertaker, has had an unique experience in his work, says the New Glasgow Enterprise. It appears that every five years the bones of every Chinaman who dies in any country outside of the Celestial Kingdom, is taken up, date of death and other particulars, and shipped to China. A ship is now at Vancouver, B. C., ready to be loaded with these boxes containing the bones and dead Chinamen. There were two from Sydney, one from Glace Bay, and one who died in Westville. The Chinese official, who is looking after this, wrote to Mr. Ross to go to Westville and disinter the body of a Chinaman, who had been buried there ten years ago, and send it on. Mr. Ross did this, and this body will go in the gruesome shipload of human bones and skeletons to China, there to be laid beside the bones of their ancestors.

ANOTHER BIG LOAN FOR BRITISH.
New York, October 25—Negotiations with American bankers for another direct British loan of not less than \$200,000,000, and may be as much as \$300,000,000, are approaching completion, according to intimations conveyed today by the fiscal and commercial representatives of the British Government. Inquiry for the loan from financial and investment sources is said to be so general as to insure its successful flotation. It is at present planned to arrange the loan of notes in three classes of even amounts, the first payable in 1919 and the remaining two-thirds in the two years following.

The loan will be a direct obligation on the Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, like the existing \$250,000,000 issue and will probably bear the same rate of interest, namely, 5 1/2 per cent. It will be secured by American and foreign collateral, mostly bonds and preferred shares, having an aggregate market value of at least twenty per cent in excess of the total amount to be offered.
A syndicate of banks, trust companies and private bankers in this city and other leading financial centres has been organized to take part in the negotiations as direct participants, with J. P. Morgan and Company as manager.
